

PATRIOTIC CLERKS HELP RED CROSS

Goldenberg's Employees Contribute \$1,023 for Relief.

BRIDGE PLAYERS ASSIST Prizes Foregone So War Fund May Be Gainer.

The war service fund of the District Red Cross was swelled today by contributions from department store clerks. Each gift represented a personal sacrifice, and the finance committee was encouraged by this evidence of the unselfish war in which citizen forces of the National Capital are raising their share of Red Cross war funds.

The employees of Goldenberg's sent a total of \$1,023.72 to Henry B. F. Macfarland, head of the finance committee. Accompanying each subscription was a check for the amount of the gift.

An auction bridge club today sent to Mr. Macfarland a letter explaining that the members desired to give the proceeds of the playing to the Red Cross instead of awarding prizes to the players. Inclosed with the letter was a check for \$11.25, and the writer promised to add to the amount from time to time.

Mr. Macfarland said today the finance committee is particularly gratified at the small subscriptions which come from clerks and employees of small means. He said prospects now are that the District's war quota of \$1,000,000 for war relief will be fully subscribed.

William M. Collier, Ex-Minister to Spain, Addresses Class.

Graduates of the nine departments of the George Washington University, the total number being in excess of 250, received their degrees at the annual commencement exercises held last night in the auditorium of the Central High School. A large number of prizes, awarded annually for excellence in the several branches of science, also were distributed.

William Miller Collier, former minister to Spain, made the principal address at the graduation exercises, and the university conferred on him the degree of doctor of laws, a similar honor being given Theodore W. Noyes, honorary degree of doctor of science, to George Perkins Merrill, Elmer Ernest Southard, Arthur Powell Davis, and Frederick Fuller Russell.

Reverend Admiral Stockton, U. S. A., retired, president of the university, distributed the diplomas. The classes were presented to him in turn by the deans of the several colleges, and the procession of graduates in caps and gowns made an impressive spectacle.

BOARD TURNS DOWN SCHOOL COLLECTION

Upholds Rule Against Plea for Colored Day Nursery.

Following its custom of not permitting collections for other than school interests, the Board of Education, at its meeting yesterday, refused to sanction the request of the Alley Improvement Association's Day Nursery to have the children of the public schools contribute one cent each for charitable work among colored children.

The request was made through Mrs. Martha M. Waldron, president of the association. She stated that because of the war, the usual revenue for the support of the work had been stopped and there was now practically no means of supporting the home on Red Cross work, the request was referred to Assistant Superintendent of Schools Brice for investigation.

Upon recommendation of Vice President Daniels, occupying the chair during the absence of Dr. John Van Schick, Jr., president, now in France on Red Cross work, the request was referred to Assistant Superintendent of Schools Brice for investigation. He will report at the next meeting.

Approval was given to the plan of the Cranch-Tyler Home and School Association to establish a dental clinic.
