GOV. STUART LEADS MARCH. Guests of Honor to Pass in Review Before the Veterans.

Among the interesting social events in connection with the Confederate reunion on the social program today are the reception which the Jefferson Davis Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy, are giving this afternoon at the Willard from 4 to 6 o'clock and the ball this evening at the Powhatan Hotel and the Arcade, with the Sons of Confederate Veterans as hosts.

The latter function, which promises to be unusually interesting to the thousands of visitors in town, is given in honor of the ladies officially connected with the reunion, including the sponsors, chaperones, maids and matrons of honor of the various Confederate organizations.

The ball will be formally opened at the Powhatan at 9:15 o'clock with a grand march headed by Governor Stuart, of Virginia, and the members of his official staff, when the guests of honor will pass in informal review before the veterans present.

This ceremony, in compliment to the veterans, will be repeated at the Arcade at 9:45 o'clock, when the ball there will be formally opened.

Rinse in three waters of about the same temperature as that in which you washed them. Smooth out flat. Spread on towel to dry.

Never let a hot iron touch the glove itself, as this will turn a white silk glove yellow, and will injure the fabric, but use a warm iron over a cloth when ironing.

How to keep white spats spotless. Put a handful of Lux into boiling or very hot water. Whisk into a lather and let spats soak until water has cooled enough for hands to bear with comfort.

Then dip spats up and down in suds, working them between the hands, without rubbing. Rubbing tends to pull them out of shape, and with Lux is unnecessary.

Rinse three times in clear, warm water. Squeeze the water out, but do not wring, and hang out to dry.

If the spats need pressing, however, iron on the wrong side.
