WASHINGTON BUYS 1,000 BONDS DAILY

Liberty Loan Enthusiasm Mounting Steadily.

BOOSTERS VISIT NAVY YARD

Volunteer Speakers Also Call on Uncle Sam's Printers.

With subscriptions pouring in at the rate of more than a thousand a day, and with practically the entire city talking Liberty loan bonds, the Liberty loan committee of the District today is continuing its organized campaign to make Washington's subscription larger in proportion to its population than any other city in the country.

Chairman Frank H. Zouck and Chief Engineer H. G. Shirley, of the State roads commission, yesterday met a delegation from Hyattsville, Brentwood, and Mt. Rainier, and inspected the course of the proposed extension of Newton street, Mt. Rainier, to the Washington-Baltimore boulevard.
