

Murderer Slain In Room Where He Killed Girl

Rejected Suitor Lured to
Scene of Crime Week Ago
and Shot by Avenging
Italian in Asbury Park
Body Riddled With Bullets

Lack of Powder Burns Puts
End to Belief He Took
Own Life in Remorse

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Aug. 10.—To mete out vengeance to Arica Picone, who, on August 3, shot and killed his beautiful cousin, Cammella Maccanico, after she had announced her engagement to a rival, friends or relatives of the murdered girl brought the man back to the scene of the shooting yesterday and fired four shots through his body. The body, riddled with bullets, was found in the girl's room.

Policeman George Jeffries was passing the home of Mrs. Anna Grosso, the murdered girl's sister, with whom she had been staying, when he heard four shots in rapid succession. The Grosso home had been closed since the day following the murder, when Mrs. Grosso had been taken to Freeport as a material witness to the crime. Jeffries entered the house, and in the room where the young Italian girl had been shot he discovered Picone's body, lying face downward, and a Mauser pistol beneath it. There were two bullet wounds through the heart, and two others through the right chest.

Reject Suicide Theory
Dr. Jamison, county physician, said he believed Picone was a suicide. The pistol, he pointed out, unlike the American army types, does not require a distinct pressure of the trigger for each explosion. This made it possible for a person thus to inflict four such wounds.

Dr. Jamison expressed the belief that grief and haunting memories had brought the man back to the scene of his crime and caused him to take his own life.

The police, after a careful examination, however, reject this theory. Picone, it has been learned, was seen a short time before the policeman heard the shots which marked his death. The fact that there were four wounds in the body, any one of which, it was believed, might have caused death, and that there were no powder marks on the body, led them to believe that the man met his death as the result of a carefully planned vengeance.

Feeling has run high in the Italian colony, where Miss Maccanico was popular.
Picone, who lived with his sister, Mrs. Sara Anna Buono, at 2812 Utrecht Avenue, Brooklyn, had only met his cousin a few months before her arrival in America. Since that time he had come frequently with his sister to Asbury Park, and paid her assiduous court.

Rejected His Suit
The girl had refused his suit, however, partly on the grounds of consanguinity and partly because a rival existed in Camucho Vetrano, a back driver.

On the afternoon of August 3 she and Vetrano obtained a license to marry. Both Vetrano and Picone were at the Grosso home for dinner that night. The engagement was announced, and the fiance departed early in the evening. Immediately he was gone Miss Maccanico had the other guests good night and retired to her room.

Picone followed her, and without a word drew a revolver and shot her, wounding her mortally. Then he leaped from the second-story window to the ground and escaped.

The police of all Eastern cities had been notified to be on the look-out for the man, but no headway had been made in locating him up to the time that his body was discovered today.

Whether he succeeded in visiting his home is not known, but he was elated in a different suit from the one he had worn on the night of the shooting. The muddy and torn condition of his clothes indicated that he had been hiding in nearby swamps.

Stock Brokers Sue Brindell
Claim Ex-Building Car, Now
in Prison, Owes \$4,993

A suit filed in the Supreme Court yesterday against Robert P. Brindell, the building trades czar, now in Sing Sing Prison, indicates that he was a speculator in the stock market. The plaintiffs are Robert P. Marshall & Co., stock brokers, who are suing for \$4,993, representing a balance due from Brindell on a brokerage account he had with the Marshall firm.

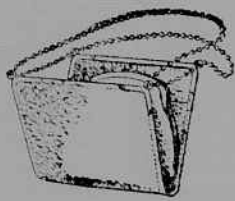
