LOUISIANA. SHERIDAN'S STORY. THE ACTION OF THE MILITARY AT NEW ORLEANS FULLY JUSTIFIED.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 9.—The following official dispatch from Gen. Sheridan was received here late last night: HEADQUARTERS MILITARY DIVISION OF THE MISSISSIPPI, NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 8.—To the Hon. W. W. Belknap, Secretary of War, Washington, D. C.:

I have the honor to submit the following brief report of the events which occurred here in the operations of the State Legislature, of Jan. 4, 1875. I was not in command of this military department until 9 o'clock at night of the 4th inst.; but I fully intend, and am willing to be held responsible for, the acts of the military as conservators of the public peace upon that occasion.

Before entering the House, L. A. Wiltz had been selected in caucus as Democratic nominee for Speaker, and Michael Hahn as the Republican nominee. Wiltz had not finished announcing the result when one of the members, Billen, of Lafourche, nominated L. A. Wiltz for temporary Speaker.

Wiltz, however, declined the nomination, and the House proceeded to elect Michael Hahn as Speaker. The Republican members of the House, in order to secure the election of a Democratic Speaker, I also know of the kidnapping by banditti of Mr. Cousin, one of the members-elect of the Legislature.
