For the purpose of showing the superiority of their own charter over the present one, over 40 points of difference are cited, and the advantages presented. A PAPER PRISON. ESCAPE OF TEN PRISONERS FROM THE QUEENS COUNTY JAIL.

About 8 p. m. on Sunday, as Jailer Stringham of the Queens County Jail, at North Hempstead, was making his usual rounds, he was surprised on real ling the door leading to the lower corridor of cells to find it open, and soon ascertained that ten prisoners and escaped. He at once sounded an alarm by ringing the Court-house beff, and in a short time several parties of armed men were in pursuit of the fugitives, but at a late hour last evening none of them had been recaptured. The jailer had been in the habit of giving prisoners who were confined in the lower tier of cells the freedom of the corridor during the day, and of locking them up in the cells only at right. They had unlocked the door leading from the corridor to the main hall with a piece of wire wrenched from a cell wicket, and, on reaching of wire wrenched from a cell wicket, and, on reaching the main hall, it was the work of a moment to gain the yard. This is surrounded by a heard fence, 20 feet high, which they scaled by means of a rope fastened outside by a har filled with sand and stones. This proves concinsively that they were assisted in their escape by confederates outside. Among the prisoners confined in the lower throof cells was Fraderick Seath, awaiting trial on a charge of assault with intent to kill, and greatly dishifted by the other prisoners, who were straid to trust him. On Sunday morning he was found dead in his cell, and as he was in good health the provious evening, it is now thought that he was point. soned by some of the escaped prisoners lest he should divulge their plan to the keeper. His body was taken, yesterday, to Jamaica, where a post-mortem examination will be held. Among the prisoners who escaped were Henry Wills, awaiting trial on a charge of marder: Authony Wallor, W.m. Crooker, John Wissman, and Presderick Brooks, Lurglary, Adam Miller and Carislopher Schock, assault with intent to kill.
