COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW-YORK.

Philadelphia Ring Nominations. WORK PROOFS OF FRAUD IN THE PRIMARY ELECTIONS-PERSONNEL OF THE CANDIDATES-THE NOMINEES-ALL TOWNS OF THE RING.

PHILADELPHIA, June 25.-The pretense that Tuesday's election was fair and honest is being gradually abandoned, and only a few Ring editors, who know better, close their eyes to the gross fraud that was perpetrated, verifying the saying that none are so blind as those who won't see. As was rendered evident at the announcement of the returns, when the District Judges-as, with a consistent want of propriety, the persons who have charge of the ballot-boxes are called-assembled and elected David H. Lane chairman, some one demanded that each judge should read his own report.

THE OFF AND SHOUTY CANDIDATES. In New-York the Ring and its associates elected respectable men by fraud-gave them good salaries, so that they would not be reckoned less popular than others. In Philadelphia this concession has been made to public opinion, the Ring feeling no compulsion to do so.

LOCAL INSTITUTIONS. P. E. THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY. The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the General Theological Seminary was held yesterday at the seminary, in Twentieth-st., between Ninth and Tenth-aves. More than 100 of the trustees were present, among whom were the Bishops of Illinois, Tennessee, Missouri, Western New-York, and the Assistant Bishop of Maryland.
