

Washington and Jefferson Football Team Battles to Scoreless Tie With California

Eastern Eleven Shows Strong Defense in Struggle on Coast

Muddy Field Handicaps Play of Undefeated Teams in Intersectional Contest; Neale's Players Make Desperate Attempts to Tally in the Final Period

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 2.—From out of the unbroken Washington and Jefferson College football team came to Pasadena and held the University of California eleven to a scoreless tie in the annual tournament of roses East vs. West game here to-day. It was the first time the undefeated Golden Bears had met their equal in two seasons, they having won every game since 1919.

The game was a hard fought, even battle all the way, although the slippery field made fast foot work and accurate passing and punting impossible. Archie Nisbet, California fullback, carried the ball for the Bears, while the Washington players made desperate attempts to tally in the final period.

California had a close call in the first quarter, when Bronckert dodged the bear tacklers and after a forty yard run planted the ball behind the Washington goal. The score was not allowed, however, as Captain Russell Stein, the President's All-American tackle, was offside when the play started.

Captain Stein Misses Goals. Both teams drove close to scores in the last period. Twice W. & J. had the ball within the Bears' forty yard line and twice Stein tried in vain to score on a kick. One attempt was a dropped kick and grounded, and the other a place kick, was blocked.

In the same period, on a W. and J. run which had slipped, California had the ball on the Bears' 22 yard line. The Bears tried a forward pass, but it was fumbled, and Erickson punted to safety.

Until today's game the Bears have had little trouble this season in piercing their opponents' lines, and when they ran into a strong W. and J. defense line were baffled. The Bears' half backs made first down twice, but failed to make any in the second half. "Greens" Neale's players made first downs six times.

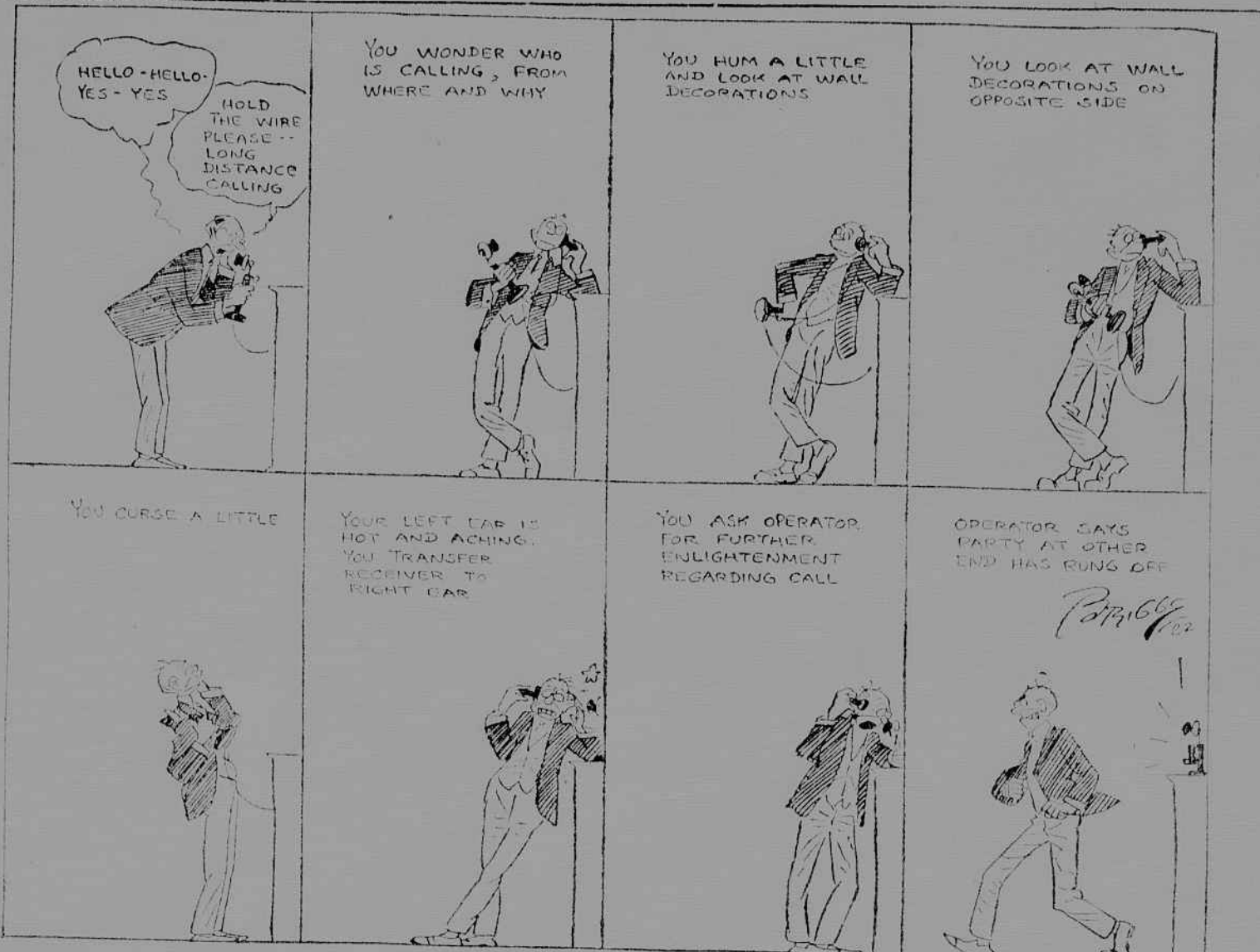

Centre Suffers First Defeat In Bowling to Texas Eleven

DALLAS, Tex., Jan. 2.—Members of the Centre College team, of Danville, Ky., which met the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College eleven at Dallas stadium here this afternoon, went to Fort Worth early today to attend the marriage of Alvin Nugent ("Bo") McMillin, one truly reflected the closeness and necessity of the circuit.

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 2.—The ten-round bout scheduled for this afternoon between Leonard, light-weight champion of the world, and Pinkie Mitchell, was postponed because of a muscular ailment, said to be an attack of neuritis, which has affected Mitchell's right shoulder and almost paralyzed his arm. The fight had been put over until January 9, when it will be held under the same conditions that were to have prevailed this afternoon.

The two boxers went through the formality of weighing in this afternoon and both tipped the beam at 137 1/2 pounds. Their agreement is to meet at catchweights in a no-decision bout of ten rounds.

Mitchell finished his active training on Saturday and was at that time reported to be in fine condition. The muscular trouble attacked him yesterday, but nothing was said about it, as his trainers and several doctors hoped to have him in shape to enter the ring this afternoon. The announcement that Mitchell would not fight and that Leonard today was made at 9:30 this morning.

Tom Andrews, promoter of the match, said at the postponement, that every seat in the big auditorium arena here had been sold. The house has a capacity of about 8,000. Many persons came here from New York and Chicago to see the fight and there was a general feeling of disappointment that this evening. It is understood that those who desire to buy tickets for the fight should see the promoter.

Steve Choyiski Breaks Arm. LYNN, Mass., Jan. 2.—The bout between Steve Choyiski, of Boston, and Pat McCarthy, of Boston, light-heavyweights, here to-day was stopped when Choyiski's arm was broken in coming out of a clinch in the second round. The referee awarded the decision to McCarthy.

Johnny Wilson Cancels Bout With Harry Greb In Garden. As has been suspected by local boxing fans for some time, there will be no fight next month between Johnny Wilson and Harry Greb in Madison Square Garden some time during February.

Wilson, fulfilling certain predictions that have been made here, has squirmed out of the match, and his manager, Martin Killilea, stated in Boston yesterday that the alleged middleweight champion had not the slightest compunction about withdrawing from the affair and leaving Mr. Tex Rickard flat.

The latest development in the mussy middleweight situation would seem to indicate that Killilea and Wilson have put something over on Rickard in more ways than one. According to Killilea, the Madison Square Garden promoter made Wilson sign articles for the Greb match before he would pay him the \$25,000 purse which Johnny was after his bout with Bryan Downey in Jersey City on Labor Day.

In a statement given out yesterday Wilson's manager declared that it was only by the aid of this condition that he could obtain the money that was coming to him. In view of this fact, Killilea said, the champion felt that he had a right to cancel the Greb engagement.

Wilson Afraid to Risk Title. When Rickard announced that Wilson and Greb had been matched for a fifteen-round encounter in February the ring sharps hereabouts refused to take the news seriously which was the dictation was made that Johnny would never risk his title by coming within reach of the dangerous lists of the Pittsburgh boy. Johnny picks 'em soft or not at all.

Wilson's action in defaulting the Greb match may lead to his being barred from further ring appearances in this state, it being certain that the matter will be called to the attention of the Boxing Commission by Tex Rickard.

The title holder has already been blacklisted by the state authorities of Ohio and New Jersey, in the former state Bryan Downey is officially recognized.

Joe Lynch Wins Over Al Walker In First Round

Former Bantam Champion Puts Californian Away in 1 Minute and 20 Seconds

Joe Lynch, in one blinding blaze of bewildering brilliance, laid the unconscious form of Al Walker, tough little Californian bantam, on the canvas of the famous sporting club ring yesterday afternoon after one minute and twenty seconds of fighting in the first round. In that brief space of time the wiry, West Side hero everything he had into the boy from the Coast, and gave the frenzied spectators a glimpse of the form that once won him the bantamweight championship of the world.

Walker weighed 122 pounds and Lynch 118. The knockout was the second that occurred in an exceptionally good New Year's program put on at the Pioneer, a certain Tommy Stapleton, of this city, having turned out the lights on one Harry Boggs, a Bridgport product, in the second round.

Shaw and Darcy Draw. Willie Shaw and Johnny Darcy fought a dizzy ten-round draw that had the crowd by the ears from start to finish, while in the semi-final Jimmy Duffy, of the West Side, and Shammy O'Brien, of Yankee, battled each other to an even break in the same number of rounds. There wasn't a point scored on the program.

Al Walker might longer if he could have weathered the blizzard of assorted volleys that Joe Lynch turned on him in the first minute of the first round. Al is a tough, hard-knocked bantam, built on sturdy lines, and to the ring-side observer seemed to have more than the four pounds advantage indicated by the official weight announcements. Lynch looked frail in comparison.

Lynch was trembling with the cold when he entered the ring and could hardly be kept in the ring while waiting for the opening bell. When it came he dashed to the center of the ring and nudged Walker with a swishing left to the spot the Californian regarded as his best. He was up, however, before referee Andy Griffith could start counting. He reached an upright position in time to stick his right foot into the corner of the ring that seemed to come from all points of the compass at once.

In a momentary clinch Walker appeared to collect himself and bared in with a series of heavy body punches that backed Lynch into a neutral corner where there was some fierce fighting. Joe dashed out of this mixture and sent into the Californian a swishing right to the forehead, followed by a left to the jaw, and a right to the temple. The latter raised above his head he fell face downward as though he had been swung by a sledge hammer as a result of the punch.

End Comes Quickly. The end came so quickly that Lynch and the referee had carried Walker to his corner before the latter's seconds could climb into the ring and take charge. It took at least five minutes to bring the Western scrapper around so that he could proceed to his dressing room.

The ten-round draw between Willie Shaw and Johnny Darcy was produced of more action than has been produced around this town since Dector was a pup.

Mayor's Decree Bans Boxing in Havana

HAVANA, Jan. 2.—Prize fighting in Havana is prohibited under a decree issued to-day by Mayor de Villegas.

The decree characterizes prize fighting as brutal and dangerous, and points out that the law which provides for fines and imprisonment for those exchanging blows in the street "cannot sanction such proceedings, even when the participants are isolated in a roped enclosure and batter each other under slight restrictions for the amusement of a crowd."
