

RUSSIAN BENEFIT BALL PROVES TO BE DRILLIANT SUCCESS

Notable Host Attends Function in Aid of Wounded in Czar's Armies.

BALLET AIDS TO BEAUTY

Washington Resident and Official Society Throgs Rauscher's for Event.

By happy accident or still happier inspiration the night of the first performance of the Serge de Diaghileff Imperial Ballet Russe was selected for the ball given at Rauscher's last evening by a committee of prominent Washington women for the benefit of the sick and wounded soldiers of Russia.

Not only did the presence of a dozen of the Russian dancers, who volunteered their services for the cause, add a touch of exotic beauty and interest to the gorgeous spectacle at Rauscher's, but at the National Theater the splendor and artistry before the footlights found echo in the audience which was one of the most brilliant that has filled a theater this season.

Allies' Envoys There. The ball, which added a tidy sum to the fund for the benefit of the Russian soldiers, was one of the smartest as well as the most brilliant functions given in Washington this winter.

Representatives of the embassies of France, Great Britain, Italy, Japan, and Belgium, the allies of Russia, were prominent in the throng, neutral diplomats by the score were numbered among the guests, and among the most interesting personages present were Mr. Diaghileff and Ernest Ansermet who conducted the orchestra of the ballet. Mrs. Blaine Seale, Viscountess de Sibur, Mrs. William Littauer, Mrs. Clarence Wilson and Mrs. Garrison McClintock constituted the receiving line and stood at the doorway leading from the small ball room into the large ball room, which was reserved for the dancers.

Orchestras Alternate. Borestein's Orchestra alternated with a Hawaiian orchestra in furnishing the music. Shortly after midnight, after the applause which greeted the spectacular performance of the Russian dancers had died down, supper was served at the small tables below stairs.

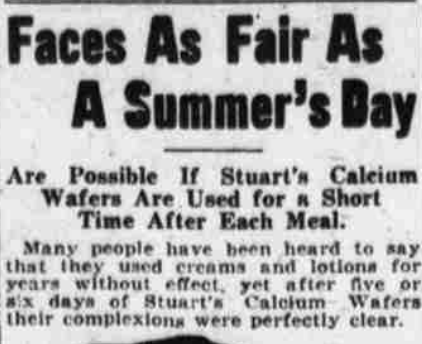
