THE THEATRICAL TRUST

Nixon & Zimmerman to Retire From the Syndicate.

Will Operate an Independent Line of Playhouses—Trouble Has Been Sent for Some Time—A Dent in Pittsburgh—Will Acquire Other Properties in New York if Possible.

NEW YORK, April 5.—The theatrical "syndicate" which controls an enormous business throughout the United States, and is composed of Messrs. Al Hayman, Charles Frohman, and Klaw & Erlanger, of New York, and Nixon & Zimmerman, of Philadelphia, is to be dissolved by liquidation and immediately re-formed with only Nixon & Zimmerman. The partnership has one season yet to run, and its terms will be lived up to until the time limit of the contract but thereafter the New York members of the firm and their Philadelphia partners will not be associated. This has been absolutely decided upon, and whatever the cause for the separation, neither Messrs. Hayman, Klaw, or Erlanger will speak today. For four years the "syndicate" has held together, and while certain peculiar occurrences within the last year have set the tongue of gossip wagging and caused whispers in inner circles, which at times were not far removed from the Philadelphia and New York members as was professed, nothing took place to separate them definitely known. Messrs. Nixon & Zimmerman, however, came into New York and hid quietly for days. It was taken almost from their very hands—bought by Charles Frohman and passed to his brother, Daniel—it did not require a very keen nose to scent trouble in the wind, or, at least, difference between partners. Nixon & Zimmerman are taking time for the fore-noon, and are endeavoring to get together in New York and other cities against the time when they will not be members of the new syndicate.

This rule was emphasized today when the Philadelphia managers announced the purchase of the Alvin Theatre, in Pittsburgh, and that they had in view the purchase of several other prominent theatrical properties in other cities.

Mr. Al Hayman, the head of the theatrical partnership, was asked today the point blank question whether the report from Philadelphia as to dissolution was not true?

"Yes, it is true," he said. "Our partnership expires after next season by limitation."

"Will another one succeed it?"

"Yes."

"All the present partners?"

"No. Not all the present partners except Nixon & Zimmerman."

PHILADELPHIA, April 5.—Neither Mr. Nixon nor Mr. Zimmerman was in the city last night, and no one in their employ was willing to speak of the reported disruption of the theatrical syndicate. It is known, however, that Nixon & Zimmerman and that a member of the firm is now in Boston with this object in view.

The level magnates do not intend to be brow beaten by their partners, and will most assuredly be found in control of a formidable chain of theatres when the split occurs.

COULD NOT SPEAK ENGLISH.

A Pennsylvania Constable Knows Only the Polish Tongue.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 5.—A Polish constable of Nanticoke came into court yesterday to make his return according to law, but his knowledge of the English language was so poor that the court was unable to comprehend him.

"Did you find any violations of the liquor laws in your district?" asked the judge.

The witness answered with a smile and a shrug, and the court was forced to say: "Well, if the people of that section choose to elect such a man as a constable they will have to take the consequences," and he permitted the return to be filed.

RESTORED BY HER FAITH

The Assertion of a Long Bedridden Sufferer.

Prayer, she declares, brought back to her the Power to Walk Without Assistance—Her Obedience to a Power Commanding Her to Rise, Miss Annie Pascoe's Strange Case.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., April 5.—A most remarkable case of healing by faith and prayer is reported from Highland Falls. The truth of the story is vouched for by residents of this city who are familiar with the case. It is declared that Miss Annie Pascoe, who had been unable to walk a step unassisted for more than five years, has suddenly recovered the use of her limbs.

Miss Pascoe asserts that upon a recent morning a peculiar sensation came over her, as if Heaven had moved before her, and she says she distinctly heard a voice commanding her to rise and walk. She hesitated, and a second command came. She then arose and walked two or three times across the room, with no assistance whatever save her implicit faith in the Almighty. She was alone at the time, and walking out into the hallway called for some members of the family. Seeing her standing alone and able to walk, they stood appalled.

The young woman says it had been her constant prayer to be able to walk, and she had faith that her prayer would be answered. She has had a trained nurse attending her for two years. The nurse, with four physicians, agreed the case was a hopeless one.

Miss Pascoe's alleged recovery astonishes the physicians who have been attending her and all who were acquainted with her previous to her illness. Some are inclined to scoff at the idea of the cure, having been performed in answer to prayer, but even the most skeptical are unable to account for her changed condition on the ground of natural causes.

The young woman relates her remarkable experience with years of gratitude coursing down her cheeks, and declares that to God and God alone is due the praise for her cure.

Some persons, however, shake their heads and declare the cure is more imaginary than real, and fear it will not be long ere the girl's lameness returns. Miss Pascoe, it is said, is gaining strength every day and hopes to be out soon.

CHILD BURNED TO DEATH.

Terrible Fate of a Little Girl at Wilmington, Del.

WILMINGTON, Del., April 5.—Little thirteen-year-old Estella Venn died yesterday afternoon at the Delaware Hospital from terrible burns sustained that morning.

Estella lived with her mother and married sister. When her mother was out Estella was left in the kitchen, while her sister was engaged on the second floor.

Suddenly the latter heard her little sister uttering piercing shrieks and calling open her door.

"Aggie! help me!"

Pushing to the landing she saw Estella tumbling on the stairs over a flaming mass. From the child's clothes she caught fire in the neck. She was not able to explain herself.

Mrs. Short, calling to her neighbors for help in the meanwhile, did all she could to extinguish the flames and was herself badly burned while doing so.

AMENDING DIVORCE LAWS.

The District Attorney's Opinion on the Bill Before the Senate.

The District Commissioners have received from their Attorney an opinion on Senate Bill 2322, to restrict the grounds of divorce and to amend the procedure in the District of Columbia and the Territories.

Attorney Duvall commends the bill, saying that it is a reasonable one, and in his opinion, should be favorably recommended by the District Commissioners. He states that divorce from the bond of marriage is the District is restricted by section 536 of the Revised Statutes, which provides seven grounds for divorce. Divorce from bed and board, the Attorney further says, is regulated by section 725 of the Revised Statutes, which provides two grounds for divorce.

The Attorney then goes on to say that the proposed bill, which amends section 725 by authorizing divorce from the marriage bond only when one of the parties has committed adultery during the marriage. It further proposes, according to the Attorney, that the marriage contract may be declared void in those cases wherein section 728 authorizes a divorce from the marriage bond, namely, habitual drunkenness for a period of three years, cruel treatment, endangering life or health, willful desertion and abandonment for two years. The proposed bill also provides that legal separation from bed and board may be granted for drunkenness, cruelty, and desertion.

The Attorney, after this statement, gives his opinion that the divorce law of the District should be amended on the ground that the dissolution of the marriage contract is entirely too easy under existing law and procedure. He therefore recommends the bill and urges that its passage be recommended to Congress.

Withdrew New York and Florida Limited.
