TALK OF TWO ELECTIONS

The Friends of Mr. Bryan May Hold a Separate Primary. The Bonst of the Norris Crowd That They Will Control the Voting Booths Resented by the Nebraska Supporters—The Action of the District Committee Denounced.

Just what is going to happen at the voting booths next Tuesday when the District Democratic Primaries are to be held for the purpose of electing delegates to the District Convention, is at present the chief topic of discussion among local politicians.

At the meeting of the District Central Committee Wednesday evening James L. Norris, who controls this committee, through a special committee appointed to prepare rules and regulations governing the primaries, told the Democrats of the District that his men would take and count their votes on election day.

When, however, at a mass meeting thousands of voters demanded the pledging of delegates, Mr. Norris appreciated the strength of the movement against the possible misrepresentation at Kansas City, and accordingly ordered the Central Committee to declare for the instructions of delegates.

Mr. Norris gave notice to the public, at the same time expressing his opposition to the instructions in a letter to the District Convention had already been selected in every legislative district. Of course, the men who were chosen at that time by the Norris men upon the basis of the instructions were not selected because of the fact that they were successful at the polls and in a majority in the District Convention.

The meeting of the Central Committee at the Democracy of the District of Columbia a few days ago unanimously committed itself to the Chicago platform and to the renomination of Mr. Bryan, although all the Norris men upon the basis of the instructions had for several days previous to that insisted that it would be a rebuke upon their character and judgment to be restricted either by Bryan or by the Chicago platform, and that Mr. Norris in his systems in the public press under the stress of the warning sent out from the National Committee that all delegates should be instructed to vote for Bryan.

Mr. Norris applies to the treasurer-ship of the National Executive Committee. It must be evident to all that to put a man in the position who is in sympathy with the Whittier, Lamont and Gorman wing of the Democracy, who have recently conspired to injure Mr. Bryan by the candidacy of Admiral Dewey, would be most unwise, because in a national campaign as great as the one now impending, the Whittier wing of either side are of the most importance. The Democracy of the District should repudiate at their polling place every candidate who is not above suspicion in his real Bryan sincerity, no matter how softly they may call for Bryan.

LICENSES FOR PHARMACISTS.

A Bill Offered to Correct a Defect in the Law. The District Commissioners are considering the bill providing for the licensing of homeopathic pharmacists in the District of Columbia.

The bill in question has the remedy of this defect in the license laws in view. It provides for the creation of a board of commissioners of homeopathic pharmacy, consisting of three physicians, that school to be appointed by the District Commissioners. This board is to examine candidates and is entitled to a fee of \$20 to pay the expenses of examining the act. The bill also provides that each person registered as a homeopathic pharmacist under the act shall be entitled to manufacture, compound, sell and dispense drugs, medicines and chemical preparations, but only in accordance with the requirements of homeopathic physicians.

HOMEOPATHISTS TO MEET. Disciples of Hahnemann Will Hold a Conference in June. The executive committee of the local branch of the American Institute of Homeopathy met last night at the Sherman Hotel to consider plans for the entertainment of the delegates to the national convention of the organization which will meet in this city in June.

The most interesting feature of the proceedings of the coming convention will be the dedication of the statue of Samuel Hahnemann, the founder of the School of Homeopathy, which will be erected on the east side of Scott Circle, Thursday, June 7, the third day of the annual meeting around the statue will be several tableaux descriptive of many scenes of the life of Dr. Hahnemann. The convention will be opened Tuesday, June 5, and continue in daily sessions until the 10th of the month. The last time the institute held its annual meeting in Washington was in 1892. At that time about fourteen hundred delegates and their friends attended the city. It is expected that the convention this year will be attended by nearly two thousand delegates.
