Fred Kelley, John A. Clarke, and several other supporters of Mr. Norris will be present. Plans will be discussed, a chairman and a secretary for the city convention tomorrow will be agreed on.

The delegates have been chosen, although Mr. Norris is too modest to acknowledge it. Four of the six will be James L. Norris, J. Fred Kelley, John A. Clarke, and William Hart.

Despite Mr. Norris' protest of innocence it may be stated on excellent authority that it has been practically decided to instruct the Norris delegates for Mr. Bryan and for the Bryan platform. This decision has been taken in self-defense.

A Norris man said today regarding the question: "We realize that if our delegates go to the National Convention instructed and another delegation goes from the District with right instructions from Mr. Bryan, there will be little chance of our being seated."

But even the decision to instruct the delegates does not wholly remove doubt from the minds of the Norris people. They wonder if when they present themselves at the National Convention, virtuous through fear instead of through choice, they will not even then be cast out in favor of the original Bryan delegation.

THE BRYAN CONVENTION.

A New Central Committee to Be Elected.

The decision of the Executive Committee of the Bryan Democratic Association to hold a separate convention and send a full delegation of six to the National Convention at Kansas City, was reached at a meeting held last night at their headquarters, 1229 Pennsylvania Avenue.

The Bryan Democratic Association and the delegates will meet tonight at the Grand Army Hall at 730 D street, a new Central Democratic Committee for the District of Columbia, and to perfect arrangements for the meeting of the convention tomorrow.

LEONA ROBERTS CONVICTED.

She is Remanded to Jail to Await Sentence.

Leona Roberts was today convicted of a petty larceny in Criminal Court No. 2 on a charge of grand larceny. She was remanded to jail to await sentence.

The defendant is a young woman, about 24-25 years of age, and had only one girl, who she said she had left at Mrs. Downer's home, and stated that she was looking for some friends, she also stated that she had not found them, and that she was hungry and cold, and asked permission to remain over night.

The request was granted by Mrs. Downer, who after giving the stranger supper, showed her to a room, where she spent the night. At an early hour on the morning of February 20, Mrs. Downer testified that she had left Mrs. Downer's house.

At the same time Mrs. Downer discovered that one of her suit boxes, a walking case and coat, all valued at \$110, were missing. Search for these articles developed the fact that Mrs. Downer's pocketbook, containing \$10 and jewelry valued at \$20, were also stolen.

The loss was immediately reported to Detective Headquarters, and late during the day Leona Roberts was arrested at the Sixth Street depot, where she was about to take a train for Philadelphia. When arrested she stated that Mrs. Downer had given her permission to wear her clothes and adorn herself with her jewelry. The defendant said she came to this city from Philadelphia, Pa.

DIED OF YELLOW FEVER.

An Arrived Steamship Reports a Case of Yellow Fever.

NEW YORK, April 11.—The British steamship Hunstan arrived this morning from Manaus and Para and reported one death from yellow fever on the voyage. Captain Jones says on March 29, on leaving Para, James McGrath, aged thirty-four years, a fireman, was reported ill. On examination the man was found to be suffering with yellow fever. Two days later, March 31, he died and his remains were buried at sea.

McGrath was a native of Waterford, Ireland. Since the death of McGrath there has been no further illness on board the Hunstan. The steamship was held at quarantine for disinfection.

Methodist Conference Pledges \$20,000 for Woman's College.

A Busy Session on This Morning of Routine Work—Appointments of Superintendents and Probationers.

The Finance for the Fiscal Year.

Bishop Walker presided at this morning's business session of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church.

The following were named as superintendents: S. A. Wilson, E. E. Shipley, G. G. Markham, L. M. Gardner, Henry Baker, C. H. Mytinger, J. T. Hall, J. R. Schultz, S. A. Wilson, O. A. Brown, J. S. Burton, W. A. Carroll. The appointment of J. F. F. Gray was changed from superintendency to effective.

The following named probationers were continued on trial: Vernon N. Ridgeley, Fletcher G. Wagon, George F. Styles, Arthur E. Slagle, and N. S. Wright. Norman R. Smith, was discontinued at his own request.

Dr. Lucien Clark, Chairman of the Twentieth Century Thank Offering Committee, submitted the following resolutions: "Resolved, That the Baltimore Annual Conference hereby pledges itself to contribute or secure the sum of \$20,000 to the Woman's College of Baltimore, to be known as the Conference Memorial Professorship, and the name in which each subscription is made shall be recorded in a memorial volume to be kept by the treasurer of said college."

"Resolved, That any person making a subscription toward said fund shall pay annually 4 per cent interest on as much thereof as remains unpaid until the entire subscription is cashed."

"Resolved, That any minister subscribing to this fund shall have the privilege of raising his subscription or any part thereof after his appointment, and any such change may be made for the annual educational collection over and above an amount equal to 10 cents for each member and probationer in his charge may be credited on his subscription."

"Resolved, That if any person subscribing to the Memorial Professorship Fund shall die before his subscription shall be paid the amount unpaid shall not be binding on his heirs."

Rev. Dr. Goodrich, President of the Woman's College, gave a short review of the history of the institution, its assets and liabilities, and his general needs. He promised to contribute \$10,000 on condition that the Conference first raise \$10,000. The following subscribed \$500 each: Revs. Baltimore, Clark, Hubbard, Hodge, S. A. Wilson, R. B. Wilson, S. A. Wilson, M. E. Wilson, Johnstone, Strickland, France, Guthrie, Wildman, Hebbard, Sitt, Nicholson, Wood, Baker, and Taylor. E. S. Wright subscribed \$1,000. The total subscription at the meeting amounted to the sum of \$20,000. There were 89 subscribers.

Dr. Clark's resolutions were adopted by a standing vote.

The Conference Treasurer, Dr. Guthrie, submitted his report, as follows: Total collections of Baltimore District, \$28,829; East Baltimore, \$17,161; Frederick, \$7,215; Washington District, \$27,122; West Baltimore, \$15,507; Grand Total, \$84,232. An increase of \$1,213 over receipts last year. The morning session then adjourned.

THE WORK OF THE METHODISTS.

Conference Makes Only One Change in This City.

The one hundred and sixteenth annual session of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, closed its proceedings yesterday evening after Bishop Warren A. Combs had assigned the presiding elders and preachers to their respective charges. Only one change was effected in this city, the substitution of Rev. H. I. Sisson for Rev. W. P. Lee of St. Martin's Chapel.

The last meeting yesterday evening was devoted largely to the reading of reports of the various boards and committees, all of which were approved.

The report of the Statistical Board showed that 1,482 infants and 1,244 adults had been baptized during the year. The report of the Epworth League showed that there were 211 chapters of that organization with a membership of 9,344. The report of the Joint Board of Finance showed there had been expended for superannuated members \$10,514; in the Bible cause, \$866; presiding elders' salaries, \$12,889; preachers in charge, \$10,217; and bishops, \$2,261.

The assets of the Board of Church Extension showed 624 societies in Church Extension, 501 houses of worship, and 39 charges without parsonages. The sum of \$1,300 was spent on education and there was an increase in membership of 200.

Before reading the appointments, Bishop Combs made an impressive address and the 1254 hymns was sung by the congregation.
