THE CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE CALAMITY. The neighborhood of the place of the disaster was yesterday dressed in mourning, the fleet of the New-York Yacht Club, anchored off the clubhouse, and the Staten Island ferry-boats having their flags at half mast, while the Canadian yacht, the Countess of Hartford, displayed the American colors half way up the foremast. Most of the flagstaffs on the island from Stapleton to New-Brighton and beyond to the Sullivans' Bay Harbor, including the colors of the Yacht Club, flew at the same height.

RECOVERY OF THE BODIES.

Rowland gave orders to have the stolen vessel taken in tow by trawls and dragged to the Kites, where it was finally ground up on the sand flats, with about 12 feet of water above its decks.
