SENATE MAY DROP PLAN TO CURB FOOD PROFITEERING IN DISTRICT

PROBERS SAY CONSUMERS DON'T SHOW ANY INTEREST

Unless the people of Washington show a determined and reasonably uniform demand for anti-food-profiteering legislation, the Senate District Committee will abandon its attempt to cut down the cost of living, beyond framing a rent law.

Senators feel that the allegations of price-fixing and of profiteering have not been substantiated by the testimony brought before them, and that the success of a commission system of price-control in Washington is doubtful.

Think Consumers Not Interested. But members of the Senate committee point out that Washington consumers do not seem to take any interest in proposed legislation.

CRAZED YANKS STARVED AND BEATEN HERE, SAYS NURSE

Insane soldiers and sailors are beaten, choked, and starved at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, according to testimony given this morning by Miss Katherine Douglas, a Washington trained nurse, to a House subcommittee investigating conditions in camps and cantonments.

STRIKE LEADING TO ANARCHY, SAYS GOMPERS

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The attitude of the authorities on the Boston police strike is encouraging Bolshevism and leading to anarchy, in the opinion of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who voiced his sentiments here today in a statement on the situation.

Other Means of Redress. Referring to the Boston police strike, Gompers said: "A method of redress is open to strikers which can be exercised collectively and which would obviate the necessity of a strike."

GOVERNOR CAN JAIL STRIKING HUB POLICE

BOSTON, Sept. 12.—It was said today that under the laws of the State, Governor Coolidge has the power to call upon the striking policemen to return to their posts, and in event that they do not, to fine or imprison them.

General Strike Uncertain. Whether or not a general strike of all labor here will be called in sympathy with the striking police is still uncertain early today.

Order Final Strike Vote. In the meantime all unions affiliated with the Central Union who have not taken a final vote on the general strike question have been ordered to take the date for a general walkout.

STEEL STRIKE COST 11 MILLIONS A WEEK

Large Sums Will Be Paid Out in Benefits, Union Leader Says.

Eleven and one-half million dollars per week will be the cost of the nation-wide strike of employees of the United States Steel Corporation and subsidiary companies, called to begin September 22, it was estimated here today.
