

LARNED STILL CHAMPION

Puts McLoughlin Away Easily in Challenge Match.

VICTORY IN STRAIGHT SETS

Lawn Tennis Veteran Beats Californian at Latter's Own Smashing Game.

By Telegraph to The Tribune. Newport, R. I. Sept. 4.—William A. Larned defeated Maurice E. McLoughlin in straight sets 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 in the challenge match of the thirty-first annual lawn tennis tournament here today, and defending his title, won the championship for the seventh time and the fifth in succession.

In duration of title holding he has become equal to the record of the first American titleholder, Richard D. Sears, who maintained his supremacy from 1881 to 1887.

Larned, who is forty-one years of age, almost twice as old as his young rival, fairly surpassed himself to-day, and the crowd of six thousand spectators who crowded every inch of space about the picturesque Casino stretch of the Regatta grounds held their breath to applaud him to the echo.

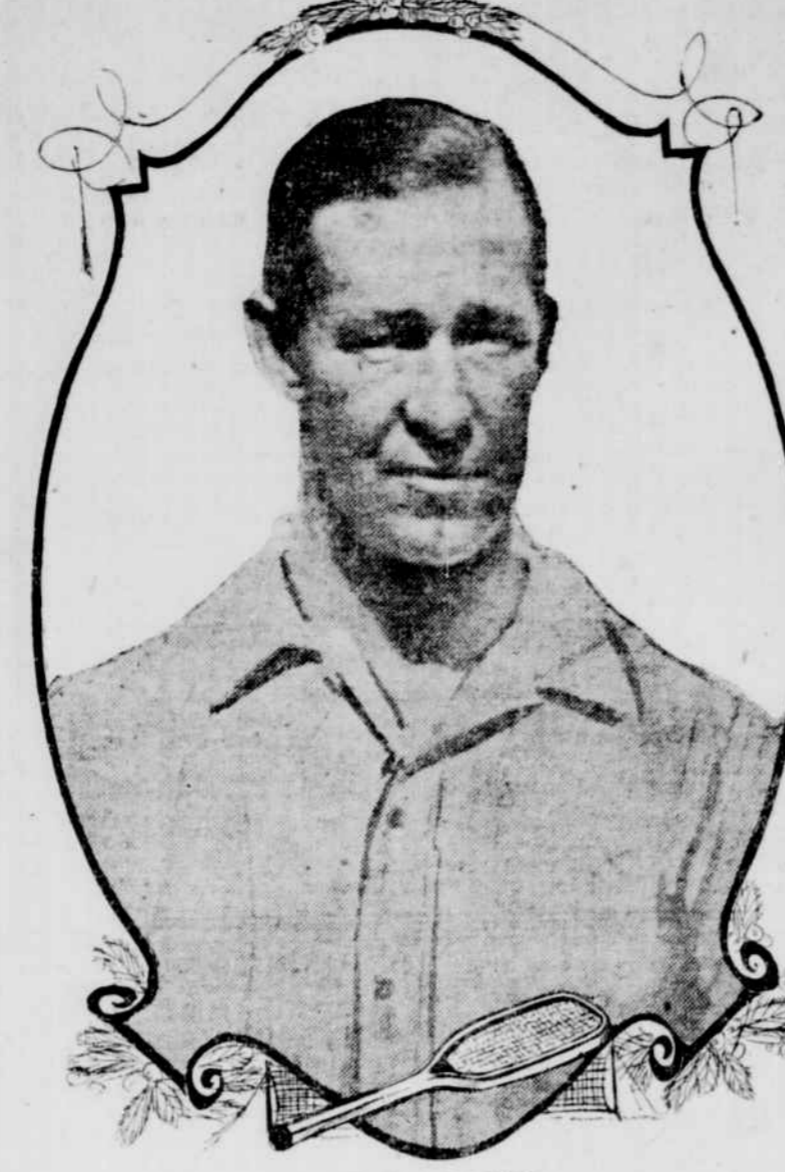
