PHILOSOPHICAL DECISIONS

Sir Frederick Pollock, English Authority, Speaks to Lawyers.

Puzzled Over the Recall Says System Might Be Excellent if Party Government Is to Be Abolished Here.

The decisions of the United States Supreme Court in the Standard Oil and American Tobacco cases, distinguishing between reasonable and unreasonable restraints of trade, received the indorsement of Sir Frederick Pollock, Bart., one of the Law Reports and one of the foremost authorities on English common law.

"About restraint of trade, I fail to understand how the Supreme Court of the United States has done more than to try to find a reasonable limit for the legislature. The speaker had been saying that an Englishman found it hard to reconcile the criticisms directed against federal judges for making new laws into the statutes or 'making new law' by judicial decision, who are condemned as creatures of the 'interests' when they do not do this very thing, and to prefer to the popular opinion of the moment."

"It seems to us in the old home of the common law," said he, "that it is the business of judges not to invent law, but to find law consistent with the settled principles and decisions of their predecessors which is binding. I understand that in certain states considerably west of the Hudson River that point of view is deemed extremely old-fashioned."

"We have not enjoyed to the full the benefits of the glorious common law because newspapers, in the interests of circulation, have conceived it necessary to cause laws to be passed by legislatures covering points adequately dealt with by the common law, and legislators, hungry for distinction, have felt it necessary to cause enactments fully provided for by the common law, and party representatives, seeking party prettles, have passed statutes dealing with restraint of trade, a subject already fully covered by the common law."
