HIGHLY IMPORTANT FROM WASHINGTON.

NEW PHASE OF THE CUBAN INVASION.

Report that Lopez was Decoyed to Cuba by a Stratagem.

WASHINGTON, September 7, 1851.

The cabinet were together to-day. I understand that from the letters of three Spanish officers to Lopez, he was decoyed to Bahia Honda by a stratagem of General Concha, and that this discovery involves a grave national question.

We are not officially advised; but according to report, this question has been under consideration by the cabinet to-day. The subject creates considerable excitement here.

Cuban Movements.

THE STRANGER PAMPERO—EMBAZCADA OF MORE VOLUNTEERS—GEN. GONZALEZ, ETC.

CHARLESTON, Sep. 6, 1851.

A private letter from Jacksonville, Fla., dated Sept. 2, states that the Pampero arrived there on the morning of the 1st, for troops that have been waiting there three months. One hundred volunteers were to have gone on board on the evening of the 2d.

Gen. Gonzalez is still in this city. He has had nothing to do with the Pampero expedition.

Wife, Sister, and Child Murdered.

WILMINGTON, (Del.) Sept. 7, 1851.

Yesterday, at Newark, twelve miles south of Wilmington, a man named Edward Ginn, shot his wife, her sister, and his own child. They all died instantly. The cause of this triple murder is not known. Ginn has escaped, but the officers are on his track.

Marine Disaster.

HARTFORD, September 7, 1851.

The steamer *Comet*, which left this city yesterday afternoon for New York, ran ashore in a thicket of near Deep River, at ten o'clock, P. M. She will probably be detained over one or two trips.

Norfolk, September 6, 1851.

The *York* Laura Snow, from Alexandria for Boston, was run into on Thursday night, on the Horse Shoe, by the steamer *Martin Hoffman*, from New York. Her bowprit was carried away, and some other damage was done.

The revenue cutter *Forward* is still detained here by an easterly wind.

SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF GENERAL NARCISO LOPEZ &c., &c., &c.

Our advice by the Empire City, published yesterday, gave an account of the fate of the Lopez expedition, and the execution of its chief. It was meagre, because we had to rely almost wholly upon the official publication of the Spanish authorities, as far as received.

The history of the recent events in Cuba, will not probably be written by any one engaged in the invasion till the affair is lost in the past; we are compelled, therefore, to give as full and connected a narrative of the events as the statements of the Spanish officials will enable us to do.

To do this, we have translated from the *Diario de la Marina, Furo Industrial de la Habana, Diario de la Habana, and the Gaceta de la Habana*, every official document relating in any way to the invasion, to the latest moment. We also give a biographical sketch of General Lopez. We arrange these documents in chronological order, to make the history as perfect as possible. SPANISH HISTORY OF THE CUBAN INVASION.

We find in the *Kingston (Ja.) Advertiser* of the 20th ult., received yesterday, by the Georgia, the following items of intelligence, which we give in connection with this history:

The Conway, with Havana dates to the 25th inst.

On the 14th, when General Enna was killed, 130 officers were also killed or wounded; the Americans had officers on board, and chambers for six sergeants. The next action was fought at Las Pajas the second of June, and the third at Cardenas.

Among the killed of the Spanish troops, it is said there are 1000 men, including the general, and 1000 officers in command being one of them. General Lopez is said to have narrowly escaped being captured, and was a Spanish sailor through the back who was in command of the *Conway*.

It is reported that the *Conway* did not assist General Lopez, in consequence of a difference among the crew, and the original intention of making the island a republic.

Among the passengers in the *Conway* in General Lopez, from Havana, changed with *despatches* for *Cadix*, from *Cadix* for *Havana*, and *despatches* for *Havana* from *Cadix*.

THE SPANISH OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

SKETCHES OF THE MOVEMENTS OF THE SPANISH TROOPS—NAMES OF SOME OF THE CAPTURED INVADERS—CONTINUATION FROM THE SUNDAY HERALD—BIOGRAPHY OF GENERAL LOPEZ.

The Spanish Official Accounts.

His Excellency the Captain General has read to the chiefs of columns in operation and to the Lieutenant Governors of Bahia Honda, Mariel, San Christobal, and Pinar del Rio, the following circular:

The pirates who tried to invade our island have been defeated; for the greater part, by the incessant attacks of the brave soldiers of our army, who had the good fortune to pursue them; and I must add, the use of a low sea and decided auxiliary aid of all the loyal inhabitants of the territory, which they guarded. Considering at the same time, the unanimous confession made by all the prisoners and those who have been shot, that they had come from a foreign country with the belief that the island would be a republic, and that the triumph would be as easy, and sure as had been promised by the traitor who committed these crimes, I have the honor to inform you that the persons who were engaged in it, and that the Cuban vengeance has been satisfied by the execution of several prisoners, and by the bayoneting of our soldiers, in fine, that the time has arrived for using clemency. I proclaim the following resolutions:

1. All individuals who were engaged in the invading band, under the orders of the traitor Lopez, will receive quarter if they present themselves, or are taken by the troops of Her Majesty, or by the Cuban troops, in the space of four days from the date that this document will be published in the respective districts. It is well understood, that the day of grace will be the day of the publication of the present order, which was executed this morning, and the same day for individuals, appertaining to all

faction, who will deliver the chief Lopez, will be freed of all punishment, and will be sent to his own country, if he or they be a fugitive.

JOSE DE LA CONCHA, Havana, August 24.

His Excellency the Captain General has received a communication of the Lieutenant Governor of San Christobal, dated yesterday, in which it is stated, that two pirates, seized by the peasants had been shot.

Resigned Rosales, in a notice of the same date, says also that fifteen other pirates had been shot on the same day. Given that the principal force had retreated to Aguacate, he directed his march toward that point, after having communicated with the column commanded by Maria Ramos, in order to operate with her, and that he had received the same day, in which the Colonel Angel Esteban defeated the pirates, had been shot in the same part of the country.

Havana, August 24.

His Excellency the Captain General received the following communication from the Lieutenant Governor of San Christobal:

EXCELLENCIA.—At this moment, (twelve o'clock) the Lieutenant Colonel, Felix Sanchez, arrived with the column under his command. As I said to you this morning, this has had the happiest consequences, and directed the army. The details of the action, which he gave me verbally, are as follows:—At 5 o'clock in the evening, the pirates, who were in the camp near Rosales, and attacked them immediately. All the soldiers, who were at the point of the bayonet, the enemy only discharged their arms and ran, on the right and on the left, toward the ridge of the hills, and the soldiers, in spite of the precipices, they threw themselves in the middle of the hills, in order to escape the destiny provided by the nature of the ground.

The result of the fight, according to the said chief, has been the complete dispersion of the banditti, who left on the right and on the left, without counting those who took flight in order to reach the mountains, and the mountains, some of them are hidden in the mountains; but it is difficult for them to live there, and the pursuit will very soon bring into our hands the forty pirates who are there.

Havana, August 26.

His Excellency has also received the communication of Colonel Ramon de Lapa, commander of the column of operations from San Christobal.

It is three o'clock P. M., and I receive from San Christobal by Nicolas Ochoa, the following letter:—In virtue of what you have deposed this morning, and the information which I received, I have ordered the troops of this neighborhood, and having mounted the known hill of La Puerta de Arroyo Grande, I have been fortunate to capture a group of pirates, towards which I marched with my troops, and I have killed several pirates and took two guns. I would have pursued them longer, but for the severity of the place, and I will endeavor to make good prosecution. The party is in the most miserable state.

All these hills, Excellency, are covered with numerous dead bodies, and the pirates, and the companies of my column are placed in various points, to be ready for the extermination of the traitors.

Havana, August 26, 1851.

The Captain-General has also received the following document from the Colonel of the staff, Joaquin Morales de Rada from Las Cuevas:

EXCELLENCIA.—In this place, a point through which cross the principal roads and paths which lead to the mountains, I received a communication from the Lieutenant Colonel, Felix Sanchez, dated yesterday, in which he informed me that he had captured a group of pirates, and that he had killed several of them, and taken two guns. I would have pursued them longer, but for the severity of the place, and I will endeavor to make good prosecution. The party is in the most miserable state.

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Brevet Colonel Ramon de Lapa has the honor to inform His Excellency the Captain General, that in concert with Lieut. Col. Felix Sanchez, he undertook to reconnoitre the broken and inaccessible straits surrounding the position in which the latter, yesterday, beat the enemy. Fully convinced that the remnants of the force could not have passed these woods, they posted their forces at the most convenient points, sending forward a small party of men, to be ready to enter into the thickets where the dispersed bands of the enemy had sought for refuge. Captain Julian Maria Sotomayor, of the 24th, took up a position with his company, and another one at La Herra, to impede the progress of a group of the defeated, among whom the traitor Lopez is supposed to be concealed, he having retreated this morning from the point of the mountains, and only made a cable outlet which is guarded by the above-named Captain into whose hands he will undoubtedly fall, should he be able to escape from the point of the mountains.

The Lieutenant Governor of San Christobal made known to the Captain General that a party of pirates, headed by the commissary, D. Nicolas Cortes, encountered thirty pirates on the road of Rosales, at the point of the mountains, and the result was that twenty pirates were killed, and twelve guns, one hundred and twenty balls, and a sword, were taken by the peasants.
