

**TAMMANY BOWLS OUT
SAGUE FOR COLLECTOR**

John Purroy Mitchel or a "Dark Horse" to Get Best Piece of Pie in New York.

MALONE AND MOORE NAMED

O'Gorman's Son-in-Law Third Assistant Secretary of State and Columbia Professor Bryan's Counsellor.

Washington, April 12.—John Purroy Mitchel, President of the Board of Aldermen of New York City, or a "dark horse" will be nominated by the President on Tuesday for Collector of the Port of New York. This became known to-day when it developed that John K. Sague, ex-Mayor of Poughkeepsie, had been eliminated from the race for the choicest piece of federal pie in New York State.

Until to-day it had been supposed that Mr. Sague led in the race, but the opposition of New York City politicians, including Tammany Hall, seems to have triumphed. President Wilson has been urged to appoint a New York City man to the place, and, supplementing this, it is known that he has a high regard for Mr. Mitchel. Adding to the belief that Mr. Mitchel has been selected is the fact that he recently announced he would not be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Mayor.

Included among the nominations sent to the Senate to-day by President Wilson were:

To be Third Assistant Secretary of State, Dudley Field Malone, of New York.
To be counsellor for the State Department, John Bassett Moore, of New York.
To be Collectors of Customs: For the district of Saluria, Tex., Andrew H. Evans; for the district of Beaufort, S. C., Franklin P. Colcock.

To be United States Judge for the Southern District of Florida, Rhydon M. Call.

To be United States Attorney, Western District of Texas, J. L. Camp.

To be United States Marshal, Northern District of Texas, William J. McDonald; Western District of Texas, John Rogers.

Wanted Another Office.

Mr. Malone, who is the son-in-law of Senator O'Gorman, who will handle practically all of the New York federal patronage, accepted the post of Third Assistant Secretary of State at the solicitation of President Wilson and Mr. Bryan, it was stated at the White House, his heart having been set on the Collectorship of New York.

With the exception of one or two from the Southern states, Senators scanned the list of nominations in vain for the names of their candidates. The greater part of the list was made up of army and navy promotions.

Some relief was expressed, however, that Secretary Bryan is to have aid in solving the problems of his department. John Bassett Moore's appointment is regarded as excellent. Because of his extensive training in diplomatic affairs, it is expected that Secretary Bryan will not run amuck and entangle himself in the intricacies of diplomatic procedure.

The nominations were referred to committees and will probably be confirmed without opposition next week.

Robert W. Jennings, of Juneau, is to be appointed United States District Judge for Alaska, and C. L. Reames, of Medford, Ore., has been selected for United States Attorney for the District of Oregon.

President Wilson has not yet chosen an Ambassador to Mexico to succeed Henry Lane Wilson, who submitted his resignation on March 1.

George W. Guthrie, ex-Mayor of Pittsburgh, and Democratic state chairman of Pennsylvania, who had been tentatively decided on as his successor, is said to have declined to take the post, though no formal offer of it was made to him. Mr. Guthrie is likely, however, to be made ambassador to a European court, possibly Italy.

Walter H. Page, who has been selected for Ambassador to Great Britain, took luncheon with President Wilson to-day. Previously he paid his respects to the British Ambassador, and later visited the Secretary of State.

Senate Discusses Civil Service.

The short session of the Senate to-day was devoted to consideration of Senator Overman's resolution calling for a list of civil service employes and certain information regarding the service. Senators Overman, Smoot and others took the view that many employes were accredited to states to which they did not belong, and Senators Cummins and Gallinger advocated curtailment of the power of the President in covering classes of employes into the service without examination or of suspending the rules in individual cases. Senator Cummins proposed that the civil service laws be codified.

The fact that the resolution offered by Senator Overman would require the expenditure of \$5,000 for the hire of additional clerks to compile it led to the reference of the whole question to the Senate Committee on Civil Service, which will probably draft a resolution that will have the way for a revision of the civil service laws.

Senator Clarke, of Arkansas, presided to-day for the first time as the Senate's new president pro tempore. Vice-President Marshall was in New York.

Dudley Field Malone is the son-in-law of Senator O'Gorman, but it is said Mr. O'Gorman had nothing to do with his appointment. He will have charge of the entertainment of diplomatic representatives of other nations. It will be his duty to meet all diplomats entitled to recognition, and so he will be a sort of social mentor in diplomatic circles. This, of course, will be in addition to the regular routine of the department. Mr. Malone has long enjoyed the friendship of the President and is on specially good terms with Mr. Bryan.

Professor John Bassett Moore has held the chair of international law at Columbia University since 1891 and is a recognized authority on the subject. He has already had considerable experience in State Department affairs, as he was Third Assistant Secretary of State from 1886 to 1891 and was Assistant Secretary in 1898. He resigned as Assistant Secretary to go to Paris as counsel to the American Peace Commission in the negotiations that brought about the end of the Spanish-American War. He was a law clerk in the State Department in 1885. He was born in 1846.
