SULTAN MAY REMOVE CAPITAL Favors Arab City of Aleppo for Seat of Ottoman Empire—Constantinople's Prestige as Diplomatic, Social or Business Centre Already Gone.

First Volume Published of Count Rodolphe Apponyi's Memoirs.

LAFAYETTE FARES BADLY

Diary Brimful of Episodes Recorded with No Thought of Their Seeing the Light.

One is carried through masked balls, dances, dinners and theatre parties, the reader becoming the confidant of flirtations, court intrigues, diplomatic moves and secrets of monarchs and ambassadors...

Count Rodolphe is also very severe upon Talleyrand, and relates how that prince of diplomacy received secret funds from the Austrian and also from the Russian court during the negotiations for the marriage of Napoleon with a Russian or an Austrian princess...

Count Rodolphe repeats some hitherto unknown stories about Napoleon which were related to him by de Juigné, who was one of the royal pages, and who was at the military school with young Bonaparte...
