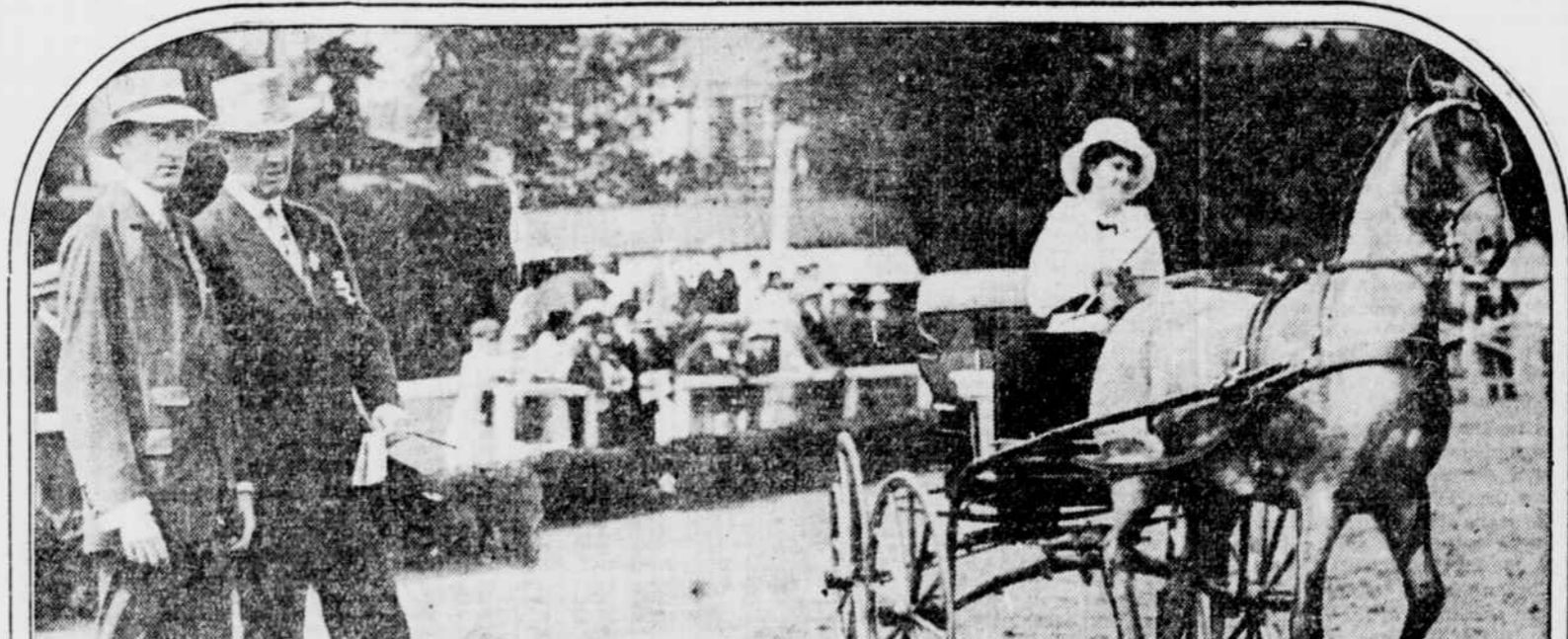

Larry Waterbury to Play with the Meadow Brook Team on Saturday.

Narragansett Pier, R. I., July 30.—W. Russell Grace consented to replace J. M. Waterbury, jr., as No. 1 for Meadow Brook in the final match for the senior polo championship to-day with Cooperstown, but just before the game a rainstorm of unusual severity broke and deluged the grounds, forcing a postponement until to-morrow.

The delay enabled Devereux Milburn, who had arrived and gone to L. E. Stoddard's home, to get into communication with J. M. Waterbury, jr., with the result that the latter said he would play if there was a delay until Saturday.

A second postponement followed, so that the final will be played on Saturday at field No. 1, with the final for the Army and Navy Cups the same day on field No. 2. It may be that this will bring about a complication, as J. B. Thomas plays on both the Leopards and Meadow Brook teams, and the former may reach the finals for the Army and Navy cups.

The assurance that Waterbury will play has strengthened the confidence of the Meadow Brook members in their team, and they do not say this to disparage W. Russell Grace's merit as No. 1, but from a superstitious current at the Long Island Club that to win any big polo match there must be at least one name beginning with a "W" on the team.
