Prince Palatine Saves Joel \$25,000

(By Cable to The Tribune.) London, July 31.—The failure of Prince Palatine to win the Goodwood Cup to-day netted J. B. Joel \$25,000.

Mr. Joel bought the horse yesterday for \$250,000, including commissions, and one of the conditions provided that if he lost a race this season \$25,000 would be cut off the price.

Prince Palatine was not himself to-day, and finished outside the money, leg weary and tired.

Miss Van Wyck retained her presence of mind, but she was pale as she stepped from the phaeton. When Royal Victoria was re-harnessed, however, Miss Van Wyck took her back into the ring, but she was not allowed to compete.

Deafened by Scold in First Round of Shawnee Golf Tourney.

WORTHINGTON IS SECOND

Hard Luck in Spots Mars Game of Home Player—Beach in the Same Difficulty.

Ward, of Garden City, won the medal in the qualifying round of the invitation golf tournament at the Shawnee Country Club here to-day with a score of 78, and then met defeat in the first match round a few hours later. The only other card under 80 in the medal round went to the credit of Reginald Worthington, the local player, who won the Buckwood trophy a year ago.

Worthington looked like a winner when he reached the turn in 36, but missed put and trouble at the fourteenth, when he took a 7, prevented his getting better than 43, for a total of 79. Ward and A. W. Tillinghast, the Shawnee president, were partners, and both went out in 40. At the short Binnick hole Ward came within 2 inches of getting a 1. He would have finished in 35 had he not needed an extra put on three of the last five greens.
