Senate Restores Cuts, Sees House Showdown

The Senate has opened the way for another showdown fight with the House over money it added to a supplemental money bill for minerals buying and a Federal flood insurance program. The bill carries supplemental appropriations totaling \$142 million for a variety of Government agencies. The money would be spent before June 30. Senate leaders were hopeful the thumping 71-5 vote by which the bill passed late yesterday would convince House conferees no Senate retreat was likely. Several times this year the House has refused to vote any money for minerals subsidies, and it also was emphatic in denying funds for the flood insurance program. On an earlier supplemental bill, the Senate finally had to yield to the House and go along with dropping all of the minerals money. But it vowed to try again, and yesterday it did so. The minerals money in the bill the Senate passed yesterday totaled \$30 million, a part of the \$70 million which President Eisenhower asked of Congress this year for the subsidies. Flight to Greece On Again as CAB Reverses Itself

Fifty Americans going to Greece under sponsorship of a Washington church club will get there in time for their family reunions, after all. The Civil Aeronautics Board relented late yesterday to permit the chartered flight. The party will leave National Airport at 7 o'clock tonight. The board canceled the flight Friday because the Christian Orthodox Youth Club of Sts. Constantine and Helen Church had solicited passengers outside its own membership, against CAB rules. The club also failed to file notice of the flight 60 days in advance. Late yesterday, the CAB told Thomas Gikas, club president, the ruling was changed because it would have caused extreme hardship to the members. Many family reunions had been scheduled and could not have been called off in time.

Rossellini Calls Reports Of Divorce 'Nonsense'

BOMBAY, May 21 (AP).—Roberto Rossellini says reports he has been living with a beautiful Indian script writer and plans to divorce Ingrid Bergman are "fantastic nonsense." The Italian film director remarked to a reporter in the lounge of Bombay's Taj Mahal Hotel: "They said something like that when I came to India to make films. What can you do about such things?" He added that Ingrid knew of the reports and that there was no misunderstanding between them. The Swedish actress said in Paris yesterday that "there is no truth at all" in the report. Mr. Rossellini laughed when told a New York newspaper reported he wanted to divorce Miss Bergman because she is "too Nordic." "Are not the Nordics supposedly extra beautiful?" he asked. He confirmed that the Indian

woman, Mrs. Sonali Das Gupta, has left her husband and lives on the same floor in his hotel that he does. "It is a sad thing she has left her home but my conscience is clear, for I have done nothing wrong," Mr. Rossellini said. By telephone, Sonali said she was ill with influenza and claimed her relationship with Rossellini is purely a business partnership. Her husband, an Indian film director, was re-

ported in Calcutta and not available for comment. "It is extremely embarrassing for me to talk about it," said Sonali, who has been described as dark-eyed and classic featured. "You will excuse me if I confine myself to my relations with Rossellini for whom I work. Everybody knows that." "I have my own reasons for leaving home," she added, "and believe me, they are powerful ones." Mr. Rossellini denied reports the Indian government and Italian Embassy had reproached him for his conduct. He is slated to leave India soon after completing one feature film and nine documentaries.

Man Is Found Dead in Mine

LYKENS, Pa., May 21 (AP).—Some 82 hours of digging, praying and hoping ended late last night when haggard rescue workers found the body of David Snyder, 34-year-old coal miner who was buried last Friday 400 feet below the surface in a Central Pennsylvania coal mine. The body of the father of three children was found by one of eight teams of five men each that had worked in the recesses of the mine since the victim was trapped by a coal slide. Mr. Snyder was working the mine with his brother, Leroy, and Mark Sponis, 65: The three owned the mine. Dr. Samuel E. Herrold of Lykens, a deputy coroner, and one of the five rescuers who came upon the body, said death was caused by suffocation. He said he had not determined when Mr. Snyder died. The body was discovered in the west gangway, a new tunnel off the main shaft. It was recovered from a water-filled pit. Dr. Herrold said Mr. Snyder apparently suffocated and then fell into the drainage pit. The body was removed to a funeral home. The victim had not been heard from since five hours after the slide. He was trapped in a passageway of the South Mountain Mine in a desolate area accessible only over a bumpy, dirt road and devoid of modern communications.

May 30 Dedicated As Day of Prayer

President Eisenhower today proclaimed Thursday, May 30, as Memorial Day and "a day of prayer for permanent peace." He called upon all Americans to dedicate the day to prayer, suggesting that the hour beginning at 11 a.m. be a period in which all "lift up our voices in thanksgiving for the courage of our fallen, in supplication for God's aid in averting war and in dedication to unceasing work for the attainment of a peaceful world."

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
