THE REPUBLICAN SENATORIAL CAUCUS HAS DECIDED ON A LIST OF COMMITTEES, AND THE ACTION OF MAHONEY YESTERDAY MAKES IT CERTAIN THAT THE LIST THIS MADE UP WILL BE THE ONE ADOPTED.

The Finance Committee will have as Chairman Morrill of Vermont; Allison will be Chairman of the Committee of Commerce; Conkling will have the Judiciary Committee, and Logan the Committee on Military Affairs.

JUSTUS SCHWAB, a Communist, who had himself imported into this country yesterday, expressed satisfaction at the czar's assassination, and then went on to say that Gould, Vanderbilt, and other American monopolists had cause to tremble, as they were oppressors of the people. The handwriting was on the wall, he said. Schwab is obviously a ruffian. He is yet at large.

ALL THE EUROPEAN CABINETS AND THE ENTIRE EUROPEAN PRESS EXPRESSED SORROW FOR THE DEATH OF THE CZAR.

The Emperor of Germany is said to be inconsolable. Gladstone, Hartington, and Granville called on the murdered monarch's son-in-law, the Duke of Edinburgh, to express condolence, and President Grévy telegraphed his sorrow to St. Petersburg. Messages of condolence were also sent from the other European Courts.

The Senate yesterday, on motion of Mr. Morgan, of Georgia, adopted resolutions condemning assassination as a means of redressing grievances of any kind, and expressing sorrow at the death of the czar, horror at the manner of his taking off, and condolence with the Government and people of Russia at their bereavement. The resolutions recall the friendly relations which have always existed between the czar's Government and our own.

IT IS SAID THAT BRADLAUGH HAS TENDERED HIS RESIGNATION OF HIS PLACE IN ORDER THAT THE GOVERNMENT MAY NOT BE EMBARRASSED BY A LONG DEBATE ON GORST'S MOTION FOR A NEW WRIT FOR NORTHAMPTON, OF WHICH NOTICE HAS BEEN GIVEN.

Bradlaugh, if his resignation is accepted, will probably seek reelection in Northampton, and, as Parnell will hardly oppose, he will doubtless be successful. He will then go through the form of taking the oath, and thus put beyond all cavil or question his right to a seat.

THE CZAROWITZ ASSUMED THE THRONE OF RUSSIA YESTERDAY UNDER THE TITLE OF ALEXANDER III.

In his manifesto to the people he announces himself as "the Autocrat of All the Russias, Zar of Poland, Grand Duke of Finland, etc.," and pledges himself to devote his whole life "to care for the welfare and honor of Russia," and calls on his "faithful subjects to unite before the altar of the Almighty their prayers" with his, and commends them to swear fidelity to him and his successor, "his Imperial Highness the Grand Duke Nicholas."

Miss Nellie O. M. Butler, daughter of J. W. Butler, the well-known paper-manufacturer of this city, was married to Mr. W. R. Linn, a prominent young member of the Board of Trade, last evening. Prof. Swing officiated.

THE TESTIMONY FOR THE DEFENSE IN THE KALLOCH TRIAL CLOSED YESTERDAY.

Kalloch himself testified. He said he went to the Chronicle office to secure the suppression of De Young's pamphlet reflecting on his father, that De Young first drew his pistol, and that he (Kalloch) fired in self-defense.

In the House of Commons last night the motion of Mr. Gladstone for urgency on Supply was defeated, not receiving the necessary three-to-one majority. The vote stood 201 to 212. Mr. Gladstone then appealed to the members to aid the Government, and the House went into Committee on Supply.
