Depositors Angry Over Tammany Men Placed in Charge.

CURSE JUDGE AND JURY

CLEARY LOSES TEN POUNDS IN JAIL

Broken in Spirit, Slayer of Son-in-Law Looks for Visit from Daughter.

Haverstraw, N. Y., July 29.—William V. Cleary, who shot and killed his son-in-law, Eugene M. Newman, last Thursday, spent an hour today in conference with his counsel, George W. Seid and Frank C. Smith, both of Newark. Mrs. Cleary was present.

After leaving the New York jail neither of the lawyers would make any comment on the case. It is thought probable that they will not until the revolver with which the shooting was done is either found or the search for it is given up.

District Attorney Thomas Gagan today again said he was on the track of the revolver and that he would have it within a few days. Some of Cleary's friends said the gun belonged to one of the men who remained in the office the day of the shooting when he went off duty.

Since his arrest Cleary has lost ten pounds. His appetite is poor and he seems to be broken in spirit since his arraignment last Monday that before his wife remained with him two hours yesterday after his attorneys had left. She told him their daughter would be coming to see him in a few days and that the young widow probably would be able by Sunday to make the trip to New York and visit him.

SMUGGLER DRUG TO CELL IN HEEL

Visitor Supplies Brother in Tombs with Cocaine and Heroin.

WORE TANS GOING IN, BLACKS COMING OUT

Navy Seeks to Punish Sailor Held as Victim of Narcotics Many Are Arraigned.

A new method of smuggling drugs into the Tombs was discovered yesterday by detectives posing as prisoners. The Cape Cod Canal, connecting Buzzard's Bay with Cape Cod Bay and shortening by seventy miles the water route between Boston and New York, was today formally opened to commerce.

The investigation followed the discovery that the prisoners confined in the special black cell aside for drug bonds were getting a steady supply of cocaine.

Reggie, who was taken to the prison each day to visit his brother, James, who is being held on a drug charge and two charges of felonious assault. James was arrested June 4 after he shot and wounded Detective Snyder and stabbed Harry Gilson, one of Assistant District Attorney Wilcox's investigators, who went to his home to arrest him.

The detective guard, who noticed that John Reggie came to the prison wearing tan shoes and left wearing black ones, furnished the clue that led to his arrest. Yesterday morning, when Reggie reached the Tombs, he was forced to take off his shoes and let the detectives examine them. It was found that the rubber heels were fastened with screws and that a cavity had been cut in each of the heels.

John was arrested immediately on a charge of selling drugs and another charge was placed against him. He is supposed to have sold the drug to the other prisoners. Underneath James's pillow was found a match box holding in all \$2,500 by Magistrate House for examination Friday.

In the Harlem Court, Max Sussman, a sailor of the battleship Utah, recently arrived from Vera Cruz, was held for Special Sessions by Magistrate House on a charge of having heroin in his possession. When the sailor was brought into court Chief Master-at-Arms William Nagel, of the 10th Precinct, reported that the sailor had turned over to the naval authorities, saying that the navy had strict provisions for just such a case.

Magistrate Levy told the master-at-arms that the sailor would be held for Special Sessions and set Sussman's bail at \$500. Sussman was arrested July 20 on Second Ave. by Detective Casper.

Henry Young, Third Ave., who was arrested Tuesday night on a charge of using opium, was held yesterday by Magistrate Freschi in Essex Market Court. He pleaded tearfully that he had the best friend I have in the world, he said.

Dr. Will E. Schock, a physician, of 104 West 41st st., was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary by Justices Russell, Kernochan and Salmon in Special Sessions in a charge of selling morphine. An investigator from the District Attorney's office purchased the drug.

CUPID SOFTENS JUDGE

Suspends Sentence as Man's Daughter Is About to Wed.

Lazarus Hannis, once a prosperous builder of Brooklyn, purchased a girl in the Federal District Court, in an indictment charging him with making "moonshine" whiskey in a Madison st. cellar.

Four honor, if this man is heavily punished his daughter, who is about to be married, will surely be deserted by her suitor, said Hannis's lawyer.

Judge Grubb suspended the federal penitentiary on the first count in the indictment and sent Hannis to Blackwell's Island for thirty days on a second count. Two years ago Hannis was sent to prison for eighteen months in Brooklyn on a similar charge.

KISSES OFFERED FOR SALE

Suffragist Advertisement Stirrs Washington Curiosity.

From the Tribune Bureau in Washington, July 29.—Just suffragists will sell their kisses. Just what sort of an oculatory offering will be put on the market has not yet developed, as the scheme is shrouded in mystery. Whether the "kisses" are to be the rosy heart variety, or a confession of some sort, is not explained in the advertisements. Pretty "kisses" at national headquarters, tucked up their lips in a tantalizing way when asked for details, although the more mantrally advocates of "the cause" are less conspicuous.

The sale of kisses will take place August 15, which has been designated "suffrage day." The commercialism in kisses, however, is only one of several schemes for raising funds, others being to sell patriots, and to sell the money to the fund.

An anti-suffragist made the suggestion that until the wares displayed placed on the market, the "suffrage" would not be apparent.

SHIFTS SLEUTHS THROUGHOUT CITY

Woods Announces Branch Detective Headquarters and Special Squads.

Headquarters for the nine branch detective districts for the greater city were announced by Police Commissioner Arthur C. Woods yesterday, with the reassignment of officers in charge and the number of men assigned to each.

The change affecting the present system of detective service will go into effect on August 1 and will be the result of a reorganization by Commissioner Rubin and Inspector Faurot.

The districts, their locations and forces are as follows: No. 1 Police Headquarters, Manhattan; Acting Captain John J. Crawford; 14th st., east and west; 123 men.

No. 2 Long Beach Building, 405 Lexington av.; 14th st. to 65th st. and west; Acting Captain Patrick Gilroy; 70 men.

No. 3 219 East 116th st.; East 59th st. to Harlem River, with 5th av. as the boundary line; Acting Captain William Jones; 42 men.

No. 4 342 West 123d st.; West 59th st. to Spuyten Duyvil; Acting Captain Alonzo P. Cooper; 42 men.

No. 5 462 East 158th st.; all of Bronx; temporary Acting Captain Andrew J. Wines; 37 men.

No. 6 Police Headquarters, Brooklyn; 72 Poplar st.; south end of Brooklyn, including Queens; Acting Captain John J. Stapleton; 60 men.

No. 7 11th St.; East District and Brownsville sections; Acting Captain John W. Duane; 52 men.

No. 8 Queens Plaza Building, Bklyn.; 72 Poplar st.; Long Island City; all of Queens; Acting Captain Herbert Graham; 18 men.

No. 9 Corn Exchange Bank Building, 14 Richmond Terrace, St. George; Staten Island; Acting Captain E. J. Van Wazer; 9 men.

Besides these districts, Commissioner Woods announced the establishment of four other squads to specialize in criminality and to have headquarters in his office.

The first will be a homicide squad, in charge of Captain Arthur A. Carey, 10 detectives; second, safe, truck and lock thieves; acting Acting Captain John J. Stapleton, 15 men; third, pick-pocket and gang squad, Acting Captain Richard McKenna, 15 men; fourth, pawnshop squad, Acting Captain John Poole, 10 men.

Commissioner Woods will add to these an Italian squad, to be known as the "bomb throwers" squad.

Police Headquarters, after a lapse of two days, will now be back-up for crooks arrested on suspicion and for examination, it was announced last night. A dozen detectives will be stationed at Headquarters at night to answer emergency calls.

The police believe that when the news of the reopening of Headquarters as a back-up reaches the underworld quarters in his office, the crooks will feel they are under the police scrutiny. "The average crook," said a detective last night, "feels comfortable and at home in the ordinary jail, but when you say 'Headquarters' to him he gets panicky."

ACTRESS LOSES AUTO IN DISPUTE

Car Belonging to Adele Ritchie's Husband Seized on Judgment.

Asbury Park, N. J., July 29. The automobile belonging to Adele Ritchie, who is in the quarrel between Charles Nelson Bell and his wife, Adele Ritchie, was seized to-day while in Mrs. Bell's possession on a judgment for debt against her husband. After Mr. and Mrs. Bell parted, several months ago, the car was taken by her to Newark. Mr. Bell had the chauffeur arrested and gained possession of it. The machine passed back to Mrs. Bell. To obtain its release now some one must file a bond to secure the judgment. If Mr. Bell does so, he will release the car for the use of his wife and it is said that he does not care for that plan. Neither is she in favor of supplying the bond, and in that way securing her husband's debt. The possession of the car is in the possession of the constable.

FOREIGN FLIERS FOR OCEAN DASH

Enea Vossi, Italian Aviator, Says Two Machines Will Arrive Soon from Europe.

Two foreign aeroplanes will be sent to this country, who will attempt a flight from the Atlantic for the Lord Northcliffe prize of \$50,000, it was learned yesterday. The Rodman Warbler, an Italian aviator and aeroplane manufacturer, who arrived on the Oceanic, of the White Star Line, brought the news of the foreign plan.

One of the aeroplanes according to Vossi, is undergoing the final tests before being crated and sent to Newfoundland. The other machine, being constructed by the Zeppelin company, the German manufacturer of dirigible balloons, will be ready soon. It is a monoplane.
