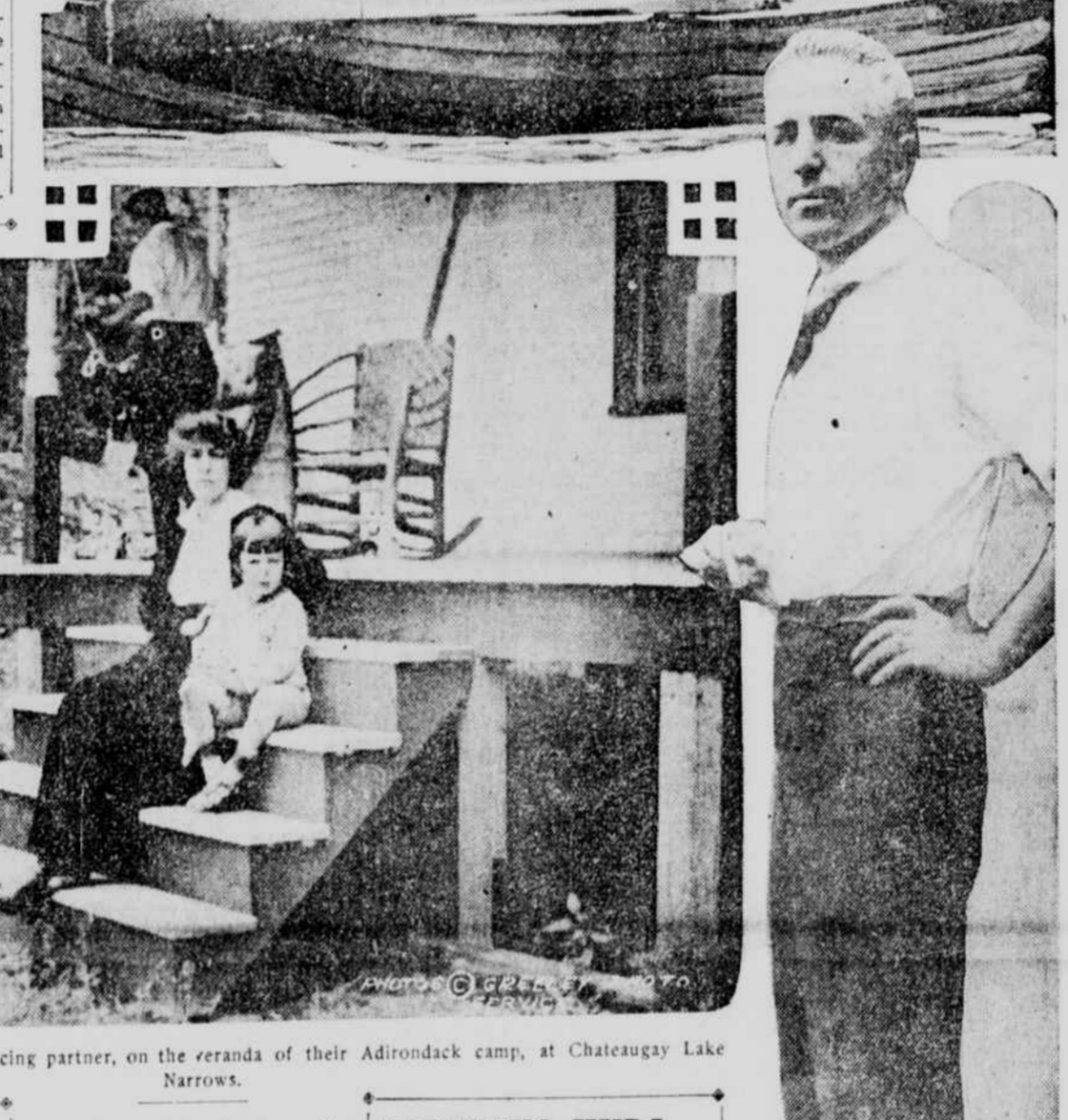
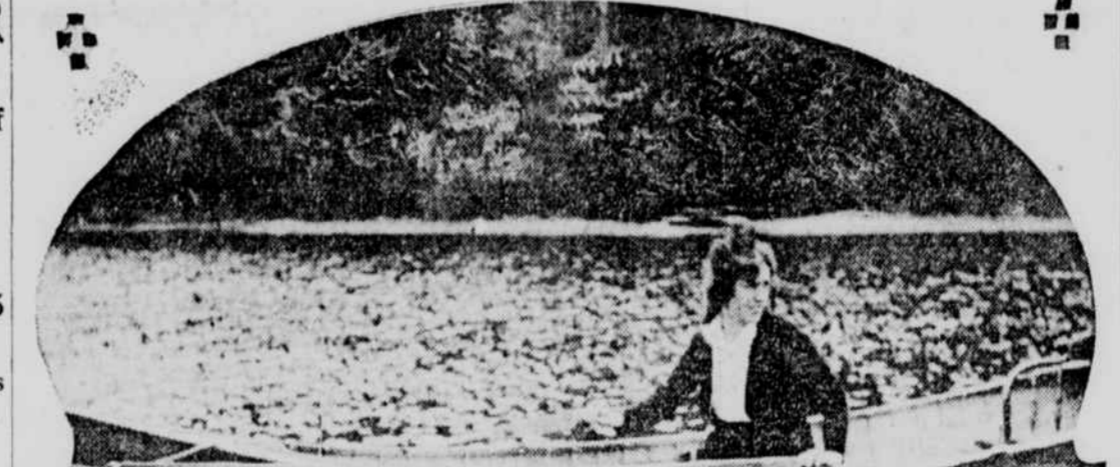
Premier Announces Casualties to Commons—Ottoman Troops Make Wonderful Defence.

Canada's Premier on Her Liner Sought by Submarines

CARRIES CARGO OF MUNITIONS

Five Americans Among 420 Passengers—Many Prominent Britons.

Predictions Now Made in German Circles Recall Similar Forecast for Lusitania.

In German circles it was predicted yesterday that the White Star liner Adriatic, which left Wednesday for Liverpool with a large cargo of war materials, munitions and automobiles consigned to the Allies, would be sunk by German submarines.

Aside from being a floating arsenal, local Germans point out, she is an especial mark because some prominent Englishmen are among her passengers.

Sir Robert Borden, Premier of Canada, is one of the passengers, bound for London to consult with the British Cabinet about the transportation of Canadian troops.

Other passengers were Captain F. Conway Jenkins, of the Royal British Aviation Corps, Dr. Charles Sarrailh, Belgian Consul at Edinburgh, and a number of British army officers.

In addition to a large quantity of ammunition and war materials, there were nearly two hundred auto-trucks and tractor engines lashed to the deck of the liner.

Although the manifest of the Adriatic's cargo has not been made public by the custom house authorities, it was asserted that duplicates were obtained by German officials.

The White Star Adriatic is not one of the newest boats in the White Star Line service, she is one of the fastest. Despite this, well posted German point out, she cannot escape the new, powerful and speedy submarine vessels before the final German answer to the last American note relative to a restriction of Germany's submarine warfare, is dispatched to Washington.

Just how the German government received news of the highly contraband cargo of the Adriatic and how its alleged intentions to sink her became known here is a matter of conjecture. It was hinted, however, that important unneutral news is daily communicated to Germany by its local agents in several ways.

One way, it was said, led via South American cables across Spain to Gibraltar to the border, and thence by courier across French territory to Switzerland and from there to Germany. Another route was over the Atlantic by wireless cables via the Dutch owned island of Curacao, West Indies, to Holland.

These round-about connections are chosen because the Tuckerton wireless station operated by the United States government and a strict censorship has been placed over the Sayville wireless station. Besides the static conditions are not always favorable for the transmission of long distance wireless messages of such importance as those which send hostile ships like the Lusitania to the bottom of the sea.

The Adriatic, under ordinary circumstances, would enter the danger zone on Tuesday evening, July 6. It may be, however, that her owners, warned by the fate which overtook the Lusitania, may order her skipper to go out of his regular course, perhaps to the north of Ireland, in order to eliminate as much as possible the ever-present danger of German submarines in the war zone around the British Isles.

The Kaiser's decision is expected in time so that the note can be presented to James V. Gerard, the American Ambassador, probably on July 5 or 6.

High officials are trying to bring about a friendly settlement of the questions with America and there is every reason to believe that they are anxious to make the proposals as conciliatory and acceptable as possible.

These officials, however, have to reckon with the force of strong public opinion, which undoubtedly will oppose anything favoring of complete acquiescence in the American proposals. This force is being skillfully exploited by those who are opposed to all concessions.

Friends of a settlement are working under these circumstances with considerable difficulty and the note probably will represent a compromise not in accordance with their desires.

Newport, R. I., July 1.—The naval fuel ship Vulcan, formerly the repair ship of the department, went aground on the southeast side of Gould Island, Narragansett Bay, during a dense fog to-day.

So far as known, the Vulcan has not suffered any damage, but it will be necessary to lighten her before she can be floated.
