"CANNOT DICTATE," PRESIDENT SAYS

Will Not Attempt to Make Party Go Any Further Than It Wishes.

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HOSPITAL NEAR SCHIFF HOME

Nassau Supervisors Plan Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Oyster Bay. Mineola, L. I., July 24.—The Nassau County Board of Supervisors authorized its chairman to-day to negotiate for the purchase of property adjoining the estate of Mortimer L. Schiff, at Oyster Bay, for a tuberculosis sanatorium. The property is that of Rufus S. Smith. The board has authorized the expenditure of \$100,000 on the project.

JOHN D.'S HOUSEKEEPER UNWISE OIL INVESTOR

Stock Included in Her Estate "Of No Value." The late Mrs. Sara D. Scott, who was housekeeper for John D. Rockefeller, evidently did not enjoy his valuable advice on investments. The Johanna Surtogates' Court yesterday, included in the list of assets 400 shares of the Caladonian Crude Oil Company, and seventy-five shares of the Johnson & Goetz Mining Company. Both stocks were put down as of no value.

THOUSANDS PAY TRIBUTE TO RILEY

Poet's Admirers Throng Capitol, Where Body Lies—Wilson Sends Message. Indianapolis, July 24.—Thousands of admirers of the works of James Whitcomb Riley, the Hoosier poet, passed before his coffin in the Capitol this afternoon and to-night. The crowds had assembled long before the doors opened at 3 o'clock, and although about seventy-five persons a minute were admitted to the building, the waiting throngs became greater as evening approached. Many were from the class about which the poet had written.

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HOPES FOR DRAW TO END ALL WAR

Dr. Fisher Sees Disaster for World if Either Side Is Victorious. Dr. Irving Fisher, professor of political economy at Yale, foresees a world disaster if the present European war ends in a decisive victory for either belligerent. He thinks its most happy conclusion would be a draw. Such a view, he believes, crystallized at a world conference of neutrals and presented forcibly to the fighting nations, would materially shorten the duration of the conflict.

NEUTRALS URGED TO CALL CONFERENCE

Decisive Gains Will Leave Future Strife Undecided, Yale Professor Writes. "Writing in this week's issue of 'The Independent,' Dr. Fisher says: 'All of us, neutrals and belligerents alike, want this to be the last great war. But the only hope of getting rid of war is to make the people disgusted with war, not only because of its continuance, but because of its vastness as a method of settling disputes.'

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
