189 KNOWN DEAD IN TEXAS STORM; LOSS MILLIONS

Gulf Coast Swept by Hurricane and Tidal Wave. Houston, Tex., Aug. 18.—The known death list in the tropical storm which has swept the Gulf Coast for three days mounted to 189 to-night, when a newspaper correspondent of this city arrived from Galveston, direct from the scene of destruction, and gave the first details of the loss of life and property.

SODA SHOWER IN NEWARK Children Wistful as 3,000 Quarts Are Destroyed.

Dr. L. M. Shaw, State Board of Health Inspector of New Jersey, and Samuel G. Sharrell, chief sanitary inspector of the Newark Board of Health, dumped three thousand quarts of soda water into a sewer yesterday. It had been taken from the bottling establishment of Edward and David Widger, at 367 South Eleventh Street, Newark. Because the soda was sweetened with saccharin, the use of which is a violation of the state law, it was destroyed.

MUNITIONS IN PERIL FROM CHURCH BLAZE

Bernstorff Sends Aid To Capital with Reply

Papen Takes Papers—Ambassador Believes Unneutrality Charges Will Collapse—Communicates Hourly with Berlin on Answer to Latest Note.

After a conference with Count von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, which lasted all evening, Captain Franz von Papen, Military Attaché of the German Embassy, was sent to Washington last night. It was reported that he carried among other important documents a reply of the Ambassador to the recent charges which have been made against officials of the German Embassy. As Captain von Papen is one of the principals involved in the alleged exposé, it is thought that he was charged with laying before the State Department his version of the correspondence between Dr. Heinrich Albert and himself, which formed part of the basis for the allegation made by the "New York Times" that officials of the German Embassy conspired to foment social and industrial unrest in this country in favor of Germany.

WORKERS APPEAL FOR WORLD PEACE

French Federation of Labor Urges International Movement to Prevent War in Future. Paris, Aug. 18.—The General Federation of Labor, the French Revolutionary labor body, last night adopted a resolution appealing to the international working classes to work "so that peace may represent the triumph of right over might, and that through the acceptance by all countries of obligatory arbitration, the suppression of secret diplomacy and of the burdens of armament may arise the possibility of a federation of nations assuring to all peoples the right to dispose freely of themselves and safeguarding the independence of all nationalities."

KAISER ASKS WAR GOLD FROM NATION

Ministers Appeal to Scholastic and Religious Officers to Obtain It. [By Cable to The Tribune.] Zurich, Aug. 18.—The German Ministers of the Interior and Finance have sent circulars to all communal scholastic and religious authorities, calling on them to use every effort to obtain gold. The "Frankfurter Zeitung" states that the government will make a financial statement to the Budget Commission in secret session and take stringent measures to prevent the proceeds of the commission being divulged. The requisition by the government of all cotton in the country and the order that textile factories shall work exclusively for the army have created consternation in the dressmaking and clothing trades.

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
