German attacks continue at various points. During the last few days their greatest efforts have been made in the vicinity of Lake Orshitsa, directly south of Dvinsk, where General Ruzsky threw them back from the town of that name.

GERMAN ATTACKS WEAKEN BEFORE CONFIDENT RUSSIANS.

Petrograd, Sept. 27.—The German aggressions on the eastern front has become noticeably weaker during the last few days.

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At the same time the Russian opposition, with the replenishment of the army's military supplies, is growing daily more stubborn, and resort is being had to bayonet attacks, with apparent all confidence and vigor.

Naples, Sept. 27.—That an attempt was made to asphyxiate the fifteen hundred Italian reservists aboard the Fabre Line steamship Sant' Anna, which was obliged to put in at the Azores after a fire at sea, is the charge made by Captain Pavy in his report to the authorities here to-night.

BLAME JOHN D., JR., FOR LUDLOW DEAD. Two Women Ask Rockefeller to Aid the Cause of Miners.

Denver, Sept. 27.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was charged this afternoon by two women friends of the miners with responsibility for the Ludlow massacre, when eleven children and two women lost their lives.

BRITISH REPULSE ALL TURK ATTACKS. But Porte Claims Recapture of Part of Anafarta Position.

London, Sept. 27.—A British official communication dealing with the recent activity on the Gallipoli Peninsula says: "The recent operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula have been confined mainly to attacks from either side by aircraft, to bombardments by artillery and to mining."

COAL ENTOMBS ELEVEN MINERS. Breaks Through Roof of Abandoned Working at Panther Creek.

Tamaqua, Penn., Sept. 27.—Eleven men are entombed in the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company's Foster Tunnel in the Panther Creek Coal Mines to-night as the result of a rush of coal and water that had broken through the roof of an abandoned working.

ITALIAN FORCES BOMBARD GORIZIA. Vienna Says Foe Shelled Red Cross Hospital.

Rome, Sept. 27.—The official statement issued to-night claims "notable progress" on the Carso plateau, south of Gorizia, made during a surprise attack by the infantry. The statement says: "In the Plezzo basin our artillery dispersed an enemy column which was descending the valley of Kurtinica and bombarded enemy working parties on Monte Rombon, forcing them to scatter."

MAY USE STEAM IN U. S. SUBMARINES. Department to Experiment on Substitutes for Gas Engines.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Steam turbines may be substituted for gasoline or oil engines for surface cruising in future American submarines. Plans have been approved for experiments with boats of the G class now under construction.

KILLS WIFE AT PHONE. Farmer Shoots Woman About to Go to Court to Testify Against Him.

Trumbull, Conn., Sept. 27.—John Haines, a wealthy Trumbull farmer, today killed his wife at her home here with a shotgun. He then escaped, the shooting is said to have followed an argument over hiring a team to take Haines to court to testify against her husband, who was charged with having beaten her last January.

CHINESE MONARCHY PUT UP TO PEOPLE. President Yuan Says Voters Must Determine Constitution.

Peking, Sept. 27.—President Yuan Shih-kai to-day replied to the recent suggestion of Parliament that there should be immediate action to determine whether the people want a monarchy or a republic by stating that the decision must await the vote of the Citizens' Convention.

MRS. BOISSEVAIN COULD STOP WAR. Given Aid of Press, Would Turn Nations to Peace in Month, She Says.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Officials are beginning to show irritation at Mrs. Boissevain's delay in communicating assurances that the illegal covering of a submarine campaign will cease. This delay they cannot explain except on the theory that the German Foreign Office is not willing to go as far in satisfying the American demands as she has indicated recently in a semi-official manner, and fears are developing that another crisis may be reached when Secretary Lansing and Count von Bernstorff meet again.

DRIVE MAY SPUR SUBMARINE WAR. Harder Bargaining by Germany in Arabic Dispute Feared.

WORK IN HAYTI FOR U. S. TROOPS. Washington Fears Outbreaks Make Reinforcements Necessary.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Fresh outbreaks in the vicinity of Cape Haytien, which necessitated the sending of American forces into the interior and resulted in the death of one marine, the wounding of ten others and the killing of fifty Haytiens, may compel this government to say to the United States to Rear Admiral Caperton. Worcester, Mass., Sept. 27.—Three hundred employees of the Leland-Gifford Company, machine tool manufacturers, struck this afternoon at 2 o'clock, the time limit set by the machinists' union for the company to grant demands for a forty-eight-hour week, five cents an hour raise in pay, time and a half for overtime and double time on Sundays and holidays. The strikers make up about two-thirds of the company's working force. This strike makes the total number of machinists on strike in Worcester 1,300.

Almonist Cancels VanDyke Contract for Vacation in Cell. It's a long way from Cincinnati to Ludlow Street jail, and, once there, it is also a long time before one can get anywhere else. Having all this in mind, Charles Ahearn, who has a troupe of trick bicycle riders in vaudeville, called at the Sheriff's office yesterday as soon as he arrived here from Cincinnati.

It was probably the first time that a man had come such a distance to voluntarily place himself in the Alimony Club. Ahearn owes Mrs. Vera P. Ahearn \$25 in arrears of alimony. His troupe was to open in Columbus yesterday, but his lawyer had advised him to come to New York and surrender for six months. Ahearn has a suit pending against Sime Silverman, editor of "Variety," for \$50,000 for the alienation of Mrs. Ahearn's affections.
