\$7 A DAY RATE AT ALIMONY CLUB

A. S. Gilbert Shows Cost of Each Matrimonial Delinquent to County.

Any person who doubts that the Alimony Club is a de luxe organization should read the statistics compiled by Abraham S. Gilbert, counsel to Sheriff Griffenhagen, who is trying to have Ludlow Street Jail abolished as an unnecessary expense to New York County.

Seven dollars a day just for hard pan necessities was the average cost in 1914 to the county for the maintenance of each prisoner. Mr. Gilbert dwelt on this extravagance in a letter which he sent yesterday to Sheriff Griffenhagen, for the information of Controller Frendergast, who sent a representative to Mr. Gilbert for some facts in connection with the campaign for doing away with the separate civil jail.

Mr. Gilbert says in his letter that there is nothing in the institution of the state which requires a separate jail for civil prisoners. He repeats his suggestion, made before the Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate, that Ludlow Street Jail be abolished, to save the county a great expense.

NEW FATHER OF "BABY" BOAT

Spears, Head of Engine Company, Says His Submarines Are in War.

New London, Conn., Sept. 28.—Another alleged father of the "baby" submarine to compete with Ford, Parkes and al. for that distinction was disassembled today in L. Y. Spear, president of the New London Ship and Engine Company at Groton, a subsidiary plant of the Electric Boat Company.

He issued a statement today saying that in 1910 he drafted three submarines, each capable of accommodating a crew of three and if necessary five men. The hulls were sent secretly across the Atlantic. The plates were assembled after reaching their destination, which, it is supposed, was one of the countries now at war.

It is understood that the total cost of this type of craft was less than the sum mentioned by Henry Ford as Professor Parkes. It is also said that the "baby" submarines have been doing efficient work in the war.

ENTOMBED MINERS DIG OWN WAY OUT

Two of Eleven Escape from Coal Fall in Lehigh Tunnel.

Tamaqua, Penn., Sept. 28.—George Hollywood and William Watkins, two of the eleven men imprisoned by a rush of water and culm in the Lehigh Coal Company's Foster tunnel at noon yesterday, were rescued alive this morning, practically through their own efforts.

According to Hollywood, he and his "buddy" had fired a shot to "make coal." The shot did not prove effective, and they went back to investigate, when they heard the rock working, and the deluge came.

They were swept off their feet by the rush of wind and Hollywood was buried up to his neck, but Watkins was able to extricate him. As the water subsided they crawled on their hands and knees through small crevices in the upper galleries.

This morning they finally heard the voice of a man in the rescue crew. They crawled down No. 18 chute until they were reached by the rescuers.

Neither had seen or heard of the other entombed men, who are now given up as dead.
