HALF OF GERMAN WORKMEN FIGHTING

Empire's Trade Delegated to Second Rank—Butchers and Brewers Lead the Field.

Washington, Sept. 30.—German trade and industry have been relegated to second rank because the demands of the government for arms and ammunition workers and for fighters have taken from these lines nearly one million men.

The smallest number that enlisted from any single trade were farm workers. Of the former only 21,461 were enlisted for war service, whereas 44 per cent of the 517,501 metal workers went into service.

The trades furnishing the largest number of enlisted men were the metal workers, transporters, wood workers, factory workers, miners, textile workers, book printers, carpenters, municipal employees, brewery workers and mill workers.
