Samuel P. Warren, 26 Years at Grace Church, Dies at 74.

Samuel P. Warren, seventy-four, for many years a well-known organist in churches of this city, died yesterday. The funeral will be held in Grace Church, at which Mr. Warren served as organist for twenty-six years, to-morrow morning at 10:30.

Mr. Warren was born in Montreal. He received his musical education in Berlin. From 1863 to 1867 he was organist at All Souls' Church, later going to Trinity Church.
