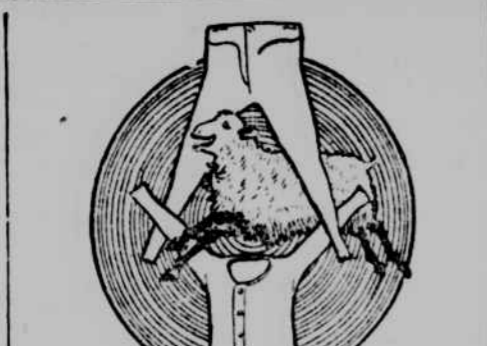

A MANIC FROM SANTIAGO JUMPS OVERBOARD TO GET A BATH. The Ward Line steamer Seneca, which arrived here yesterday from South Cuban ports, brought with her W. H. Seymour, engineer's yeoman of the refrigerating ship Glacier, who was rescued from drowning after he had thrown himself from the ship into the sea near Cape Cruz, Seymour came aboard the Seneca in charge of Surgeon Thomas T. S. N. of the cruiser Cincinnati, and an attendant. He was mentally deranged, and was bound for St. Elizabeth's Hospital for the Insane in Washington.

DRUGGISTS LEAGUE FOR SHORTER HOURS.

The officers of the Druggists' League for Shorter Hours have been investigating three accidental poisoning cases which happened in the last two weeks, and give out the following results of their inquiry: In one case a woman had been suffering from rheumatism and an injury to her leg. She had been unable to sleep, and on November 15 a physician gave her a prescription calling for morphine in raspberry syrup, and when she had taken the first dose she had been given the second dose, and the patient, for the symptoms were those of belladonna poisoning. After examination he found the bottle in the medicine cabinet, and the patient was able to leave the bed. The drug clerk who had made the mistake was discharged, though he possibly would not have committed the mistake if he had many hours of work had not made him over-tired.

REFORMED EPISCOPAL CELEBRATION.

At the First Reformed Episcopal Church, Madison-ave. and Fifty-fifth-st., Bishop William R. Nicholson, of Philadelphia, preached yesterday morning on the occasion of the celebration of the Twenty-fifth anniversary of the formation of the Reformed Episcopal denomination. Bishop Nicholson selected for his text Isaiah xliii, 10: "Ye are my witnesses, saith the Lord." The speaker dwelt at length on the number of witnesses which God should have in the Christian Church. He referred to Paul, Isaiah and John as examples which the Christian people of to-day should endeavor to imitate. Bishop Nicholson said that he believed that the Reformed Episcopal Church had a God-given place in Christendom, and that Jehovah was saying to her as He said to Isaiah: "Ye are my witnesses."
