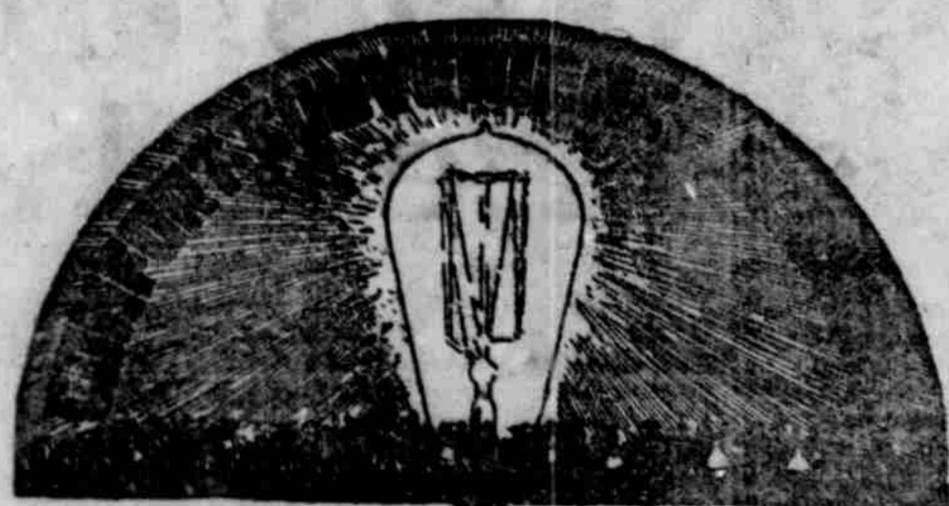

## CANNING CLUBS PREPARING FOR OPENING OF FAIR

The fair is occupying the atten-  
tion of the canning clubs at pres-  
ent, according to Miss Lonny Lan-  
drum, home demonstration agent, and  
all of the members are engaged in  
preparing their record books of the  
crops this year. These books form a  
story of the work, and presents a  
complete history of the particular  
crop it has reference to.

The keeping of the books is a part  
of the canning club work, for an ex-  
hibit without the story is not consid-  
ered complete. Entries are made for  
nearly every day and record the num-  
ber of cans, as well as the condition  
of the crop and the general condi-  
tions which affected it.

This season, of course, the entry of  
July 5, will be given undue promi-  
nence, for the storm of that day very  
nearly crippled the work for the sum-  
mer. But as soon as it was over the  
girls set about planting other crops  
and it is expected that the exhibits  
this year will compare favorably with  
those of former years.

## AUDITING COMMITTEE OF GULF BEACH HIGHWAY MAKES MONTHLY REPORT

After a month's work on the Gulf  
Beach Highway, ending Saturday, the  
committee in charge of the work, has  
submitted a report on the expenditures  
which have so far been made. As the  
money which is being used to carry on  
the work was subscribed by the peo-  
ple of Pensacola, the manner in which  
it has been disbursed is therefore of  
interest to all who contributed to the  
fund.

The itemized statement, which fol-  
lows, shows the amount of money re-  
quired to construct the road, and the  
committee emphasizes the necessity of  
being unhampered by the lack of  
funds. Many of the subscribers have  
paid the money to the committee, but  
in order to continue the work and  
carry the road to a successful com-  
pletion, it is imperative that the com-  
mittee have sufficient funds to com-  
plete the road.

To this end all persons who sub-  
scribed to the fund for building the  
road are urged to pay their subscrip-  
tions immediately, for upon them de-  
pends the continuation of the work.  
While no general campaign for addi-  
tional money will be inaugurated, the  
committee requests all who wish to  
add to their former contributions to  
do so at once, or any other parties  
who were not in the city at the time  
of the campaign. The amount makes  
no difference, the large sum collected  
in the early summer was made up  
of subscriptions from ten cents to  
fifty dollars. The road is for all of  
Pensacola and all of Pensacola is cal-  
led upon to help build it.

The Gulf Beach Highway will make  
Pensacola a great summer resort, and  
the development of the city is of  
great importance to every person in  
it. Are you doing your bit to help?
