LOCAL SAILOR DECORATED FOR GALLANTRY

CHARLES W. BATEMAN RECEIVES CROIX DE GUERRE FOR SERVICE WITH SIXTH REGIMENT OF MARINES.

"For conspicuous bravery in action," Charles W. Bateman of 915 East Gadsden street, has been awarded the Croix de Guerre with star by the French Republic. Capt. Bennett will present the decoration at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon at the Army-Navy-Shipbuilders' celebration at Fort Barrancas.

Young Bateman was a pharmacist's mate in the navy and attached to the Second battalion of the Sixth regiment of marines under the command of Col. Harry Lee. He was very well known throughout his unit for courage and efficiency under fire, having taken part in several offensives.

The official citation describes how he gave aid to the wounded during a violent action at Crezy and bore wounded men to places of safety despite the fierceness of the enemy fire. This will be the first presentation here of a medal for bravery in the recent war and it will be made the occasion of an impressive ceremony.

Capt. Bennett, will have as his staff, members of the army, navy, and marines corps.

Col. Lee, under whose command Bateman served, married Miss Saltmarsh, of Pensacola, and is well known here.

WALNUT HILL YOUNG MAN IS IN JAIL HERE

HENRY CHEATHAM IS ACCUSED OF ASSAULT UPON UNION GRIMLER, HIS NEIGHBOR, WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

On a charge of assault with intent to murder, Henry Cheatham, a young white man of near Walnut Hill, was brought to the county jail yesterday morning by Deputy Sheriff George Hall. Report yesterday from the vicinity of Walnut Hill, was to the effect that Union Grimler, who Cheatham assaulted, is not expected to live. Grimler is the man who was reported to have been killed Wednesday night near Walnut Hill. He was severely stabbed and cut about the abdomen and chest, according to reports from the scene and little hope was held out for his recovery.

Cheatham declines to make a statement concerning the affair though according to reports the two men met in the road Wednesday night and the affray occurred, had feeling having been engendered, it is said, by remarks of Grimler concerning Cheatham's wife.

HAROLD HUDSON IS RUN DOWN BY AUTO AND PAINFULLY HURT

As the result of having been run down by an automobile yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock at Garden and Palafox streets, by an automobile driven by Mrs. J. A. Merritt, Harold Hudson, living at 254 1-2 South Palafox street, sustained a badly bruised foot and other minor injuries.

The injured boy was taken to his home following the accident by Mrs. Merritt and Dr. Pierpont summoned to attend him. The accident was investigated by Police Officer Ellertson and a case for violation of the city traffic laws made against Mrs. Merritt.

At 3:45 yesterday afternoon there was a collision of two automobiles, one driven by N. P. Cornellin and the other by Freddie Faulk, at Belmont and De-Villier streets. Both cars were slightly damaged though no one was hurt. A case was made in police court against Cornellin by Officer Burke, who investigated the accident.

CARRIED BOOZE INTO GEORGIA IS CHARGE MADE

New York, July 3.—Charged with conspiracy, which it is alleged resulted in thousands of dollars worth of liquor being smuggled into the dry state of Georgia, during the last few months, Louis Einsidler, a Brooklyn wholesale liquor dealer, and Jacob H. Middleman, a Brooklyn leather dealer, were today held in \$5,000 bail each by United States Commissioner McGoldrick to await extradition proceedings by the governor of Georgia. Government agents say porters and trainmen were involved in the conspiracy and that other arrests are expected.

On May 1, it is charged, thirty suit cases filled with liquor were put on a train for Savannah and thrown off at the little town of Ludowic. From Ludowic the liquor is said to have been taken to Savannah and other towns in automobiles. Several arrests have been made in connection with the case of Georgia.
