JAPAN SENDS CONCILIATORY NOTE TO U. S.

Document Deals With Complaint Against Japan for Lax Cooperation in Operation of Trans-Siberian Road.

Tokio, Nov. 9.—The conciliatory and dignified nature of Japan's reply to the American note of last September, complaining of lack of co-operation of Japanese troops in the operation of the trans-Siberian railway, is believed here to have removed any danger of serious complications between Japan and the United States over conducting the railway. In effect the replay ratifies the arrangement reached at Vladivostok by Roland S. Morris, the United States ambassador, and General Oi, commander of Japanese forces in eastern Siberia and commits Japan to co-operation in the future. Under the circumstances it is considered unlikely here that the United States will further pursue the matter. The Chinese consortium question, however, has come strongly to the foreground as a problem requiring immediate and frank negotiations. The Washington government has already informed the government of Japan that the United States is quite unable to accept Japan's proposal to exclude certain districts of eastern inner Mongolia and South Manchuria from the scope of the consortium. Announcement of an independent loan to China of \$30,000,000 by a Chicago bank was made simultaneously. The loan is secured by a tobacco and wine monopoly.

This is taken here as a hint that unless Japan sees her way clear to joint consortium on reasonable terms, the United States may adopt the policy of a loan group in which, considering the financial conditions of the European nations, Japan would hold a leading role. Indications are that Japan's leading bankers favor unconditional pooling of the powers for a loan to China, though certain powerful business houses have joined military circles in backing the movement excluding Mongolian and Manchurian zones.

The Associated Press correspondent gains the impression from talks he has had with those interested that the exclusion of certain kinds of loans such as railroad concessions, rather than the exclusion of definite territories, will be a basis of possible settlement.

DRYS JUBLANT OVER OHIO VOTE

LOSS OF NEW JERSEY DOES NOT DISTURB PREPONDERANCE OF PROHIBITION POWER THEY ASSERT.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 10.—While the "wets" can see but little encouragement from their victory in New Jersey, a wet state, last week when Edwards was elected governor on a platform of doing all he can to keep the state as "wet as the Atlantic ocean," the "drys" are jubilant over the dry victories in Kentucky and Ohio.
The victory for "law and order" in Massachusetts is gratifying to the drys who consider it a clear indication that the people will stand firmly for strict carrying out of the prohibition enforcement law.
The New Jersey election has an interesting prohibition enforcement phase. Some weeks ago Internal Revenue Commissioner Roper wrote to the governors of all the states urging their cooperation for enforcement of the prohibition laws. Last week Edwards was elected governor of New Jersey with the declaration that he would do everything possible to keep the state wet, as his principal platform plank.
With nation-wide prohibition becoming effective very soon political leaders of both parties in Washington no longer consider prohibition a national issue. The New Jersey result is considered worthless as having any bearing on 1920.
The wets had expected that the "growling" going on apparently everywhere over the speedy coming of national prohibition would bring about overwhelming defeat of the dry amendments in Ohio and Kentucky.
To their amazement both states went dry. Kentucky, it was believed, would show its disapproval of the action of congress in denying the Kentucky whiskey dealers an opportunity to dispose of many million dollars worth of "wet goods" they have on hand by defeating the prohibition amendment. Instead the state went dry with many thousand votes to spare.
Officials of the Anti-Saloon League headquarters in Washington are jubilant over the apparent dry victory in Ohio, where a vote was taken on the referendum on the federal amendment, because they believed it spells disaster for the wet referendum movement throughout the country.
"Ohio is the only state in the Union that has a constitutional provision for a referendum on the federal amendment," said Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League here today. "In Washington, the only other state where the supreme court endorsed a referendum by a divided court, the petition for the referendum is contested and doubtless no election will ever be called."
"In Oregon and Maine, the courts have decided against the referendum. Cases are pending in the supreme courts of Nebraska, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas, California, Michigan and Colorado. In Idaho and Utah, the wets failed to secure their petition. Petitions have been circulated in Wisconsin, Arizona, Nevada, Missouri and South Dakota.
"The defeat of the wets in Ohio clinches victory for the 18th amendment even if a referendum was legal," continued Mr. Wheeler. "In all probability there will never be another referendum in any state on the federal amendment. Even if it was permitted they would only have a fighting chance in Missouri, Wisconsin and California. This would leave forty-two states in favor of ratification of the prohibition amendment, six more states than needed to ratify."
