THREAT TO EXPEL MEMBER OF HOUSE

Thomas L. Blanton of Texas on the Rack for Affidavit Published in Congressional Record.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The house was asked today to expel one of its members—Thomas L. Blanton, Democrat, of the seventeenth Texas district—for causing to be published in the Congressional Record an affidavit relating to a row at the government printing office which was characterized as obscene and unprintable.

Presented on the Texas forty-ninth birthday by Representative Mondell of Wyoming the Republican leader, the resolution was placed on the table for consideration and vote Thursday, because of Blanton's absence from Washington. He left here Monday night or Wednesday, W. Va., to make a speech in accordance with arrangements made prior to the action of the house Monday in expunging his undelivered speech containing the offending affidavit from the record, but is expected back tomorrow.

Examination of the house proceedings, parliamentarians announced, failed to show where a member had been expelled except during Civil War days. Many demands for expulsion have been put forward, but censure only resulted, some representatives resigning before the house acted.

A two-thirds vote of members present would be required to expel Blanton. On the question of voting on the Mondell resolution, leaders declared the house would vote without regard to party lines. The Texas delegation will meet tomorrow to discuss the case and it was said to be quite likely that a substitute measure, providing for censure instead of expulsion would be presented.

The storm that had been sweeping the house since discovery Saturday of the Blanton's "extension of remarks" in the record did not seem to grow in fury until after elimination of the speech, which was not made on the floor. Finding a number of members were preparing to demand action, the Republican leaders took the bull by the horns and called a meeting of the steering committee at which veteran representatives were invited in and asked to express their views. Thirty minutes later Mr. Mondell entered the chamber with a resolution in his pocket.

Meanwhile attempts had been made to get in touch with Blanton to notify him of the step contemplated and his office said he would return tomorrow and "make a statement in the house." There were intimations that an apology was in prospect.

There was a tense moment in the house when the leader, rising from his

seat, sent to the clerk's desk a paper with a request that it be read. The roll call just ended, showed Blanton absent. Necks were craned as Mr. Mondell, turning to the Democratic side and pitching his voice, asked: "Is the gentleman from Texas present?"

Getting no response, and declaring that it was a serious matter and believing it unseemly to proceed with its consideration in the absence of the accused, Mr. Mondell announced that he would call it up tomorrow. Later, however, it was agreed to act on it Thursday.

Blanton Denies Allegations. WHEELING, W. Va., Oct. 25.—Thomas L. Blanton, Democrat of the 17th Texas district, whom the House was asked to expel today by a resolution presented by Representative Mondell, republican leader, on a charge of having caused to be published in the Congressional Record statements that were "obscene and unprintable," denied in a speech tonight before the Wheeling district industrial relations association, that there was any obscenity in his remarks. Referring to his speech in the House, Mr. Blanton said: "Any woman or any child could read all that I have printed without a single blush of shame."

Mr. Blanton said he would fight the expulsion charge to the bitter end. "I have not been a fighter heretofore," he said. "But from now on I will fight to the utmost. No one can say I have hit below the belt, nor will I begin that sort of fighting now."

The congressman in a speech on "Gompers' struggle hold on, our government must be broken," said Samuel Gompers, was at the bottom of the charges made against him. Mr. Mondell, he said, had been influenced by Gompers in the action taken today by the House. He said the trouble arose over his efforts in behalf of two government printing officers, one of whom cause he had championed when a foreman had refused to allow them to work as journeymen printers, owing to their union status.
