## County Commissioners.

Madison, Fla., Aug. 2, 1911.  
The Board of County Commissioners met this day in regular session with all members present.

Board was called to order by the Chairman, and minutes of the last two meetings were read and approved.

Henry Gill was put on pauper list at \$1.00 per month from July 1st. Georgyann Banks was put on pauper list at \$2.00 per month from date, as was also Sallie Rizer at \$5.00 per month from date.

Petition to causeway and bridge immediately on the south side of same was read, July considered, and approved, and Comr. Harrell was appointed a committee of one to go upon the ground and make specifications and to solicit the assistance of F. M. Tooke in laying out the right of way and specifications, together with the approximate cost of same.

Upon motion, W. P. Thompson was granted \$50.00 to be expended in filling in deep washout on Oakland public road.

Petition to have the Board rescind a former order granting the opening up of a public road from Glendish school house via Lee Harrell's place and Fannie Sarles' place, was duly considered, and after hearing arguments pro and con, in the absence of a motion to rescind the said former order remains as granted, and the said road was ordered opened up.

The matter of building a new steel bridge over Alligator Creek was taken up and duly considered, and upon motion the contract to build said bridge was given to Converse Bridge Co. for \$8,000, payable July 1st, 1912, without interest, said bridge to be completed as per specifications on file and turned over by Oct. 1st, next.

## Mrs. W. C. Martin Passes Away After Lingering Illness.

On Sunday morning, after an illness lasting for the past several years, and which she had borne with the greatest patience, Mrs. Mary Gaston Martin, wife of W. C. Martin, passed away at her home in this city.

Mary Gaston Martin was born in Madison County, January 6, 1878, and was therefore in her fifty-fourth year at the time of her death. On January 30, 1879, she was married to W. C. Martin, and in 1901 the family moved to Madison, where they have since resided.

The deceased leaves to mourn her loss a husband, W. C. Martin; four children, Wadden, Gordon, Delta and Ruter; two sisters, Mrs. Russell Flowers and Miss Eliza Gaston of Hamburg; and four brothers, H. W., J. W., and J. S. Mrs. Martin had been a great sufferer for several years, and during the last four months had declined rapidly until the end came. She was laid to rest in Ebenezer cemetery at Hamburg Monday afternoon, Rev. Dr. Hudson of the Methodist church conducting the funeral.
