Madison, Fla., Dec. 20, 1911. Board met in called session on this day to inspect new building. All Board present.

The question of insurance coming up, on motion it was ordered that the proposition from Livingston & Morrow to carry premium on same till July 1, 1912, for two per cent. be accepted and the Superintendent was instructed to have policy taken out at once.
