Madison, Fla., Oct. 6th, 1908. Council met in regular session. Present D. H. Yates, W. B. Davis, Walter Bunting and E. C. Hassell. The President being absent W. B. Davis was duly elected president pro tem. The minutes of last meeting was read and approved.

The finance Committee made the following report. That they met the School Board this day in reference to the appropriation of the Town for school purposes. It was agreed that the Town should pay one thousand dollars. The School Board agreed to refund to the Town \$150.00 as soon as the state pays in the amount due said school. A communication was received from Prof. W. B. Cate in reference to increasing the school facilities; same was tabled until next regular meeting.

A communication was received from the Mayor conveying his reasons for vetoing Ordinance No. 56 and after being read the veto was sustained.

Dear Sir: Two men on opposite sides of the same street sell sausages, one at 10c lb. the other at 5c. Which sells the more sausages, think you?

The answer is: It depends on the street. There are plenty of streets in the world where 5c sausages go like the wind.

Florida Tobacco.

We recently received by the kindness of Congressman Sparkman, the annual Year-Book of the Department of Agriculture, for 1907.

In looking it over, we happened upon the Tobacco statistics of the states where it is grown, and were surprised to note that Florida tobacco sold for a higher average price per lb. than that of any other state viz 45 cts. Georgia comes next at 40 cts. The Connecticut product brought only 11 1-2 cts., and although Connecticut raised three times the quantity, yet the Florida growers received nearly \$700,000 more money for theirs.

The same is true of the rice crop of which Florida is credited with 65,000 bushels, average price being \$1.10, while Louisiana rice averaged only 85c per bushel.—Wachula Advocate.

Track Laying on Near Cut.

Track laying has begun on the Georgia & Florida between Douglas and Hazelhurst and is progressing at the rate of half a mile a day. It is about ten miles from Douglas to where the cut-off strikes the line again, and the distance to Hazelhurst will be greatly shortened. The company expects to have trains running over the new line by the first of November, and in a short time, to have a double daily from Hazelhurst to Madison. Train service will be maintained from Douglas to Broxton over the old line.—Douglas News.
