# British Warships Instructed to Seize All Ships, Regardless of Flag, Carrying Commodities to or from Germany

## SULTAN PREFERS BEING CAPTURED BY ALLIES TO POSSIBLE TORTURE

LONDON, MARCH 16.—DESPITE THE EFFECTIVE FIRE OF THE ALLIES' FLEET ENGAGED IN TRYING TO GET THROUGH THE DARDANELLES, THE TURKS HAVE BEEN ABLE TO REPAIR SOME OF THEIR DAMAGED FORTS AND MOUNT NEW GUNS, SAYS A DISPATCH RECEIVED FROM ATHENS TODAY.

CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE IS REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN DONE TO BRITISH AND FRENCH WARSHIPS. THE HOSPITAL SHIP, CANADA, ON THE WAY TO MALTA, FILLED WITH WOUNDED.

THE TURKS ARE WORKING DESPERATELY TO STRENGTHEN THE DEFENSES OF THE BOSPHORUS.

ALTHOUGH URGED TO LEAVE, THE SULTAN REMAINS IN CONSTANTINOPLE, DECLARING THAT HE HAD RATHER BECOME A PRISONER OF THE ALLIES THAN TO FALL INTO THE HANDS OF THE WILD TURKS."

**GERMANS LOST 18,000 MEN IN FOUR DAYS.**  
 LONDON, March 16.—The war office estimates that Germany lost 18,000 men around Neuve Chappelle on March 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th.

**BIGGEST BATTLESHIP LAUNCHED TODAY.**  
 NEWPORT NEWS, March 16.—The dreadnaught Pennsylvania, America's largest battleship, was successfully launched at 10:00 o'clock this morning.

**166 BRITISH SHIPS OUT OF COMMISSION.**  
 LONDON, March 16.—Up to March 10th, 166 British merchant ships had been interned, captured or destroyed since the beginning of the war, according to an official statement.

**COTTON CONSUMPTION INCREASES.**  
 WASHINGTON, March 16.—The census bureau's report issued today shows that 463,167 bales of cotton were consumed during February, against 431 during the corresponding month last year.

**NEW CENSUS DIRECTOR TAKES OFFICE.**  
 WASHINGTON, March 16.—Samuel Rogers, of South Carolina, was today appointed as director of the census, to succeed William J. Harris, recently appointed by President Wilson as a member of the federal trade commission.

 M. McQueen, traveling passenger agent for the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railway, with headquarters in Knoxville, Tenn., arrived in Daytona Monday and will be here until the end of the season, looking after the interests of the passenger traffic aboard over his line. **ORMOND DWELLING DESTROYED BY FIRE**  
 MEMBERS OF COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD, WHO WERE INSPECTING PUBLIC SCHOOL, ASSISTED IN SAVING HOUSEHOLD GOODS.

## WASHINGTON MAKES NO EFFORT TO CONCEAL ITS EXTREME DISPLEASURE

WASHINGTON, MARCH 16.—SECRETARY OF STATE BRYAN HAS RECEIVED THE BRITISH REPLY TO THE AMERICAN NOTE REGARDING FOODSTUFFS AND SUBMARINES, SENT THE GOVERNMENTS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND GERMANY WHEN THE LATTER DECLARED A BLOCKADE AGAINST ENGLAND. THE SECRETARY ALSO RECEIVED FROM AMBASSADOR PAGE THE TEXT OF THE BRITISH ORDER ESTABLISHING A GENERAL EMBARGO ON GERMAN TRADE.

IT IS THE GENERAL OPINION IN OFFICIAL AND DIPLOMATIC CIRCLES HERE THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL PROTEST TO GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE AGAINST THE ORDER THAT ALL TRADE WITH GERMANY BE STOPPED.

NO ATTEMPT IS BEING MADE TO CONCEAL THE FACT THAT ENGLAND'S ACTION IN ISSUING THE SWEEPING EMBARGO ORDER IS MOST DISPLEASING TO THIS GOVERNMENT.

**LONDON, MARCH 16.—THE BRITISH ORDER PROHIBITING MARITIME COMMUNICATION WITH GERMANY HAS BEEN WIRELESSED TO ALL BRITISH WARSHIPS. NO REASON FOR THE ORDER WAS GIVEN. ENGLISH WARSHIPS ANYWHERE ON THE HIGH SEAS CAN ARREST SHIPS OF ANY COUNTRY CARRYING COMMODITIES TO OR FROM GERMAN PORTS.**

THE NEWSPAPERS OF LONDON AND OF THE BRITISH ISLANDS ARE WARMLY COMMENDING THE GOVERNMENT.

**POLISH CITY UNDER BOMBARDMENT.**  
 PETROGRAD, March 16.—The Germans are violently bombarding the fortress of Osowiec with heavy guns. The enemy has been able to move some batteries near the city, but so far the cannonading has been ineffectual. In the night sorties the Russians captured a number of Germans. A German force attempted to approach the frozen Bobr river, south of Augustowa, but were repulsed, with severe losses.  
 The Russians are holding the enemy along the entire front in the region of Przasnysz.  
 Deep snow is retarding military operations in the Carpathians.
