# Useless Are Protests of Neutrals, Says Official of English Government

## EMBARGO ON COMMERCE WITH GERMANY COSTING U. S. \$100,000 PER DAY

WASHINGTON, MARCH 17.—GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS ESTIMATE THAT THE BRITISH EMBARGO ON GERMAN SHIPPING IS COSTING THE UNITED STATES \$100,000 A DAY, ON ACCOUNT OF LOSS OF CUSTOMS DUTIES.

PERSONS CLOSE TO THE ADMINISTRATION SAY THAT IT IS CERTAIN THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL MAKE A FIRM PROTEST AGAINST GREAT BRITAIN'S EDICT.

LONDON, MARCH 17.—GREAT BRITAIN WILL MAINTAIN HER BLOCKADE OF GERMAN PORTS. PROTESTS BY NEUTRAL NATIONS WILL CAUSE NO ALTERATION OF THE GOVERNMENT'S PLANS TO ISOLATE GERMANY, ACCORDING TO A STATEMENT MADE BY A HIGH OFFICIAL TODAY.

## RUSSIANS EXPECT FALL OF PRZEMYSL SOON; WILL THEN ATTACK KRAKOW

PETROGRAD, MARCH 17.—THREE DESPERATE SORTIES BY THE AUSTRIANS FROM THE FORTRESS AT PRZEMYSL DURING THE LAST TWO DAYS WERE REPULSED BY THE RUSSIANS WHO ARE PRESSING NEARER AND NEARER TO THE BESIEGED STRONGHOLD. THE SITUATION INSIDE THE CITY IS CRITICAL AND IT IS EXPECTED TO FALL WITHIN A SHORT TIME.

WITH THE FALL OF PRZEMYSL THE RUSSIANS WILL ADVANCE ON KRAKOW.

## THOUGHT CONFERENCE TODAY MEANS ITALY IS SOON TO JOIN ALLIES

ROME, MARCH 17.—A LONG CONFERENCE WHICH IS BELIEVED HERE TO HAVE BEEN A "WAR COUNCIL," WAS HELD AT THE ROYAL PALACE TODAY. PREMIER SALANDRA WENT TO THE PALACE EARLY THIS MORNING AND WAS CLOSETED WITH THE KING FOR OVER AN HOUR.

AN EXTRAORDINARY CABINET MEETING HAS BEEN CALLED FOR TOMORROW, AND EVERY MEMBER OF THE KING'S BODY OF OFFICIAL ADVISERS HAS BEEN COMMANDED TO BE PRESENT.

THE GERMAN AMBASSADOR CALLED AT THE FOREIGN OFFICE TODAY, BUT STAYED ONLY A SHORT TIME.

IT IS GENERALLY REPORTED THAT A CRISIS HAS BEEN REACHED AND IT IS ALMOST UNIVERSALLY BELIEVED HERE THAT ITALY WILL JOIN THE ALLIES WITHIN A FORTNIGHT.

**OFFICIAL BERLIN STATEMENT.**  
 BERLIN, March 18 (Official).—After a three-days' battle, the Germans captured a cliff northwest of Arras. At Vauquois and northwest of Pont a Mousson the French were repulsed.  
 In making a flanking movement in the vicinity of Taurroggen, Poland, the Russians were repulsed. They were also checked in their operations between the Orzyo and Szckwa rivers.
