SPOT COTTON QUIET AND STEADY AND UNCHANGED.

A Strong Demand For Spirits Turbentine But the Sales Light-Rosin Market Firm and Unchanged With no Sales-The Wholesale Markets Steady and Unchanged-A Decline in the Egg Market-Markets by Telegraph.

Savannah, Jan. 25.—There was very little doing to-day in the leading departments of the market, greater interest seemed to be centered in the coming election and markets. Cotton remained quiet and steady with sales of only 223 bales. Spirits turpentine was very firm at 25 1/2c, but the offerings were only 189 bales. Rosin was bulked firm and unchanged, but no sales were reported. The general market was steady and unchanged. There was another drop in the price of eggs, the supply being large.
