Cost of Running a Locomotive.

"How much does it cost to run a locomotive?" said a railroad man. "Well, more than you would think. If a locomotive were starting out on a 100 mile run and you were asked what the cost of the run would be to the company, the chances are that you would say about \$10. But it costs a little more than 20 cents a mile to run a locomotive, on an average. Nearly 8 cents of this is for fuel, 7 1/2 cents for pay of engineer and fireman, a half cent for oil and waste, and more than 4 1/4 cents for repairs. A ton of coal will run a locomotive twenty-four miles, a pint of oil will run eleven miles, and a pound of waste 123 miles. The locomotives of a railway like the Northwestern run half a million of miles a month."—Chicago Herald "Train Talk."

High Prices for Tall Footmen.

In England the footmen are usually great strapping fellows, selected for their height and the size of their calves. A tall one fetches more than a short one, and many ladies are particular that they shall be good looking.
