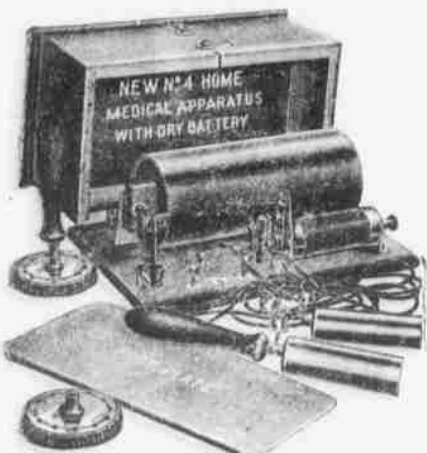

The schooner Honolulu, which arrived today from Port Ludlow after a passage of 25 days, reports having experienced rough weather. Nearly all of her sails were blown away during the voyage.

Captain and Mrs. Bray entertained about seventy-five guests representing all nations and all the vessels in the harbor at Christmas dinner Tuesday evening at the Sailors' Home.

Six inches of rain is reported by E. E. Damon from Moanalua and six and a fraction from Manoa valley. On Pacific Heights a little over five inches fell altogether during the storm.

The Mutual Telephone Co. by Godfrey Brown, treasurer, gave a check for \$100 to Chief Engineer Charles Thurston of the Honolulu Fire Department to be distributed among the members of the department. In recognition of cable services.

High Sheriff Brown and Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth were each presented with a gold police badge Tuesday by Police Officer Ah On whose life endangered in the course of his duty has several times been saved by the timely interference of his superiors in the department.

TWENTY INCHES OF WATER. The storm sewer proved inadequate to the sweep of water that came down and the road and sidewalks were under water during the heavy rain to the depth of twenty inches or more.
