Holland to force justice in its claims in Venezuela, and it is believed he so timed his departure as just to escape the Dutch battleships and cruisers now engaged in a spectacular demonstration off the coast.

Additional evidence pointing to these facts came in a dispatch from Berlin to the effect that Dr. Israel, the noted surgeon that Castro had announced was to operate on him, had received no word from the dictator.

That Castro is in flight is an accepted fact in Venezuela. Mutterings of revolt are heard already, and a new revolution—the fifty-ninth, in the ninety-seven years of Venezuela's existence—is expected to start any day.

ONCE A CATTLE THIEF.

Cipriano Castro, "the cattle thief President," "the little black monkey of the Andes," "the human porcupine," "the Bad Man of Caracas," "the Assassin of the Andes,"—to cite only a few of his many cognomens—is one of the most picturesque adventurers of all history, and the story of his rise from professional cattle thief to President, dictator and multi-millionaire, who set all the civilized powers by the ears, is a most amazing romance.

He is today at once a J. P. Morgan, a Napoleon, a Captain Kidd, a Senator Foraker and a "Fingy" Connors. He rose from the very dregs and by unique ability and unscrupulousness equally unique he has made himself one of the most conspicuous and interesting figures in the world. His newest title is "World's champion grafter."

Castro is part negro, part Indian and part Spanish. He was born in 1860. He was one of sixty children of a small cattle raiser at Capacho, State of Cachira, on the slopes of the Andes near the Colombia border, his father being a believer in Mormon doctrines.

Young Castro tended cattle, ran a country store and finally took to the business of cattle thieving—and it was a business in that part of Venezuela in those days.

He had an ingenious system of evading the police.

When the Venezuelan authorities got after him he would take his herds across the Colombian line. When the Colombian officers got on his trail he would return to Venezuela. Finally, the two nations got together, made a raid on the same day, and put Mr. Castro out of business.

The future dictator was greatly annoyed. He vowed vengeance, and took to politics to carry it out. He joined a two-by-four revolution, which soon collapsed. However, he was elected a member of Congress, and proved himself the "Sockless Jerry" Simpson of South America.

WEARS GLOVES, BUT NO SHOES.

Like the other cattle rangers he never had worn shoes and socks in his life, and he entered the halls of Congress in bare feet. Finding that shoes were quite the proper thing in the capital, he bought a pair and would wear them to the capitol each day, remove them, place them on his desk and put them on again as he left the building. In spite of his lack of shoes he always wore white gloves.

One day some one stole a herd of Castro's cattle. He appealed to President Andrade to get them back. The President refused, and Castro returned to his cattle ranges in a rage, determined to start a revolution. As he left the palace he bellowed to a hooting and jeering crowd. "The next time I return to Caracas it will be at the head of an army." Indeed, he spoke the truth.

No comic opera revolution was ever funnier than that engineered by Cipriano Castro at its inception. He had twenty-three followers (the figure had no cabalistic significance), and he proposed to conquer a nation! He did it.

His army of twenty-three grew to hundreds and then to thousands. He marched on Caracas, defeated the forces of General Andrade, entered the capital and proclaimed himself president. Andrade fled in the Venezuelan navy—i. e., a little steam launch. He proved that he had a real sporting instinct by sending the launch back to La Guayra with this note to Castro: "I return you the navy, having no further use for it. You may need it in your business. Many thanks."

Then Castro began grafting in a generous, whole-souled manner that would make Boss Tweed blush with envy. He got his rakeoff on the customs, on crime, on building operations, on all commercial activities. In two years he had amassed \$3,000,000 and began "salting" it away in Europe ready for the day when he should be prepared to use it. In March, 1901, he had himself elected President, and in 1905 he was elected for a second term this time of six years.

Revolutions, of course, arose. That headed by General Matos was smashed in 1902, and that of Paredes a year or two later. Paredes himself and several of his relatives being poisoned by Castro's order.

The American asphalt trust, which owned a huge lake of asphalt, had been so injudicious as to contribute funds to the Matos revolution. Castro seized the plant of the company. He ousted the honest judges of his courts, appointed his satellites, ignorant of law, to the supreme Court, and that

tribunal, which now included a teamster, a porter and a butcher, gave a decision fining the asphalt company \$10,000,000 and confiscating its property.

One foreign interest after another came under a similar ban. Castro annulled their rights and took charge of their property. The Caro Railroad, the Callao and Inshaka mines, the Manoa Plantation Company, several steamship lines and the French Cable Company fell in turn into his maw. He grew rich so fast that he could not count his millions.

He has been perpetually imbrotted with foreign nations. England, France and Spain blockaded his coast in 1901. He expelled the French and Dutch ministers and put the American minister Russell in such a position that he was forced to withdraw.

CASTRO'S PERSONAL HABITS.

Personally Castro is small, insignificant and extremely ugly, the photographs which show apparently a man of culture and intelligence having been carefully doctored by his orders. He has the manners and morals of a mule driver, is scarcely able to read or write and is fond of dissipation. He is a tremendous drinker. No sooner does he arise than he takes a large tumbler full of the strongest of French brandy and continues the potation at intervals throughout the day, complaining occasionally that he never can get brandy strong enough.

He is intensely egotistical and highly superstitious. He calls himself solemnly "The Napoleon of the New World," and cultivates a fancied Napoleonic resemblance.

At a banquet, at which he ate more like a pig than like a human being, he told the foreign diplomats that he and 500 of his troops could have taken Port Arthur in three days, while the Japanese were a year about it. He believed firmly in his "star of destiny," and once pointed out the planet Jupiter to the wife of the American Minister as the ruler of his fate.

Finally, he is an arrant coward, as shown by his action in the earthquake of 1900, when he jumped thirty feet from a palace window, leaving his wife and child to their fate.
