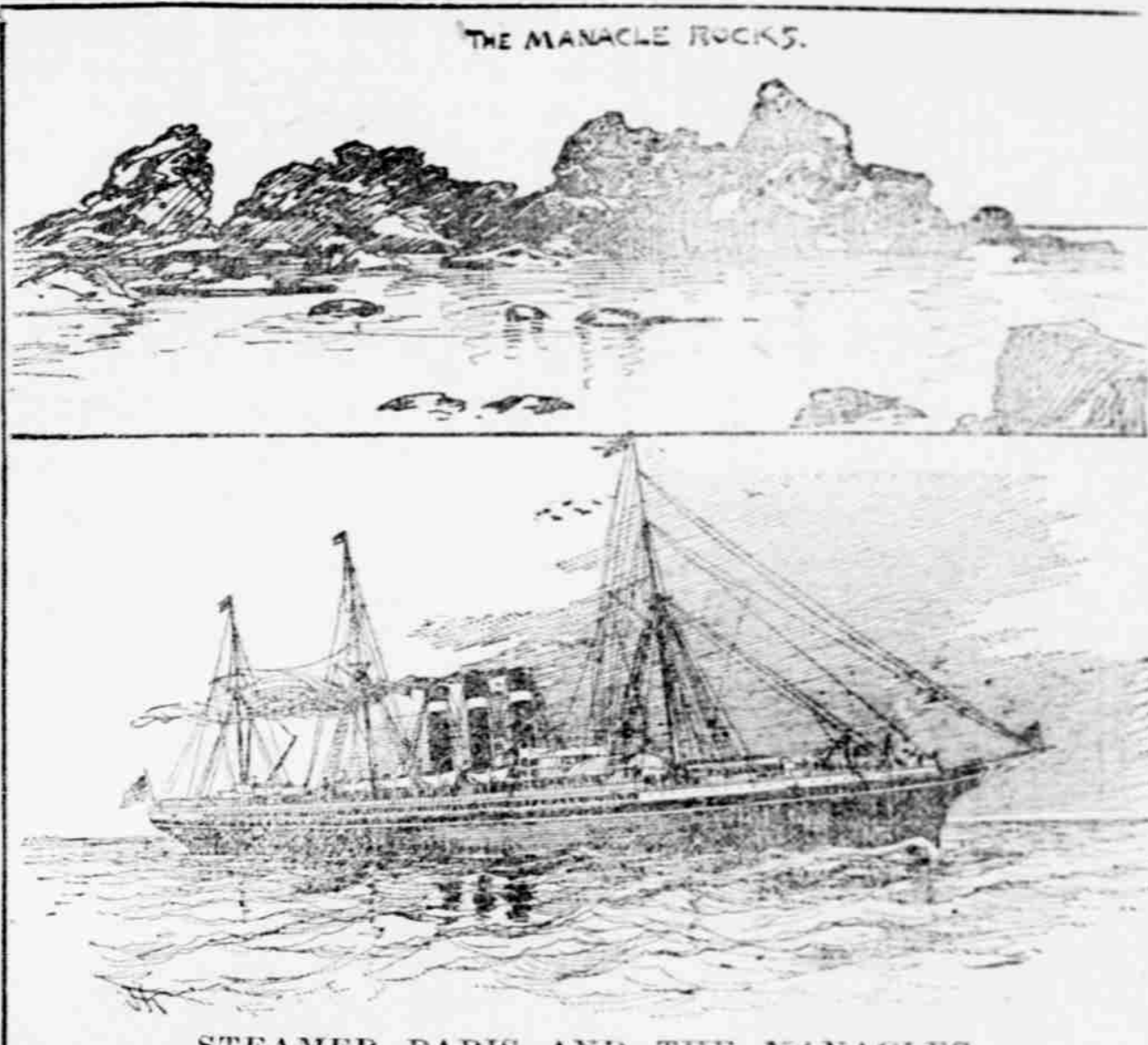

**YOUNG HOODLUMS**  
Are Ruining Everything  
at Thomas Square.  
Professor Berger and Residents of the Vicinity Appeal for Police Protection for the Park.

The condition of affairs at Thomas Square has become simply disgraceful. It is infested nights and Sundays by a bowling gang of young hoodlum boys—and girls too—who turn what should be a pleasant quiet retreat for ladies, children and lovers into a pandemonium, and on Sundays even into a resort for gamblers. This has continued for some time and it is steadily growing worse. If the police instead of looking after five cent domino games in Chinatown would drop in on Thomas Square of a Sunday afternoon they would find several gambling games both with cards and dice running in plain view. In another part of the square they could find one or more baseball games going on and at the Beretania street corners usually gangs of loafing hoodlums who disturb the neighborhood with their loud cursing and ribald and indecent language. These hoodlums run in bands of from three or four to twenty. They may be seen stringing along the Waikiki road in the early morning and returning after noon laden down with coconuts, mangoes, stray ducks and chickens, the fruits of numerous depredations resulting in many instances in broken fences and such like injuries to private property. In the afternoon they rendezvous in Thomas and Emma Squares and in vacant spaces on the city front.

"When the band assembled in Thomas Square on Tuesday evening," said Professor Berger last night, "to play the usual concert, we could not light the gas. The gas man was summoned and found that hoodlums had played havoc with the fixtures, the arms had been broken off and the gas jets plugged up with paper and wood. It was lucky we had no explosion. The caretaker of the square was summoned, and he told the old story that ever since vacation commenced half grown school boys have made the band pavilion their headquarters, spending their time in playing hoodlum tricks, climbing the trees, robbing birds' nests, breaking the trees and shrubbery and generally doing all the mischief they possibly can. The caretaker tries to drive them away but without avail. The hoodlums throw stones and sticks at him and have hurt him severely at times. There is never a policeman in sight for a whole day. It is time that police should afford some protection to the beautiful grounds of Thomas Square and the bandstand."

**NOW A CAPITALIST.**
