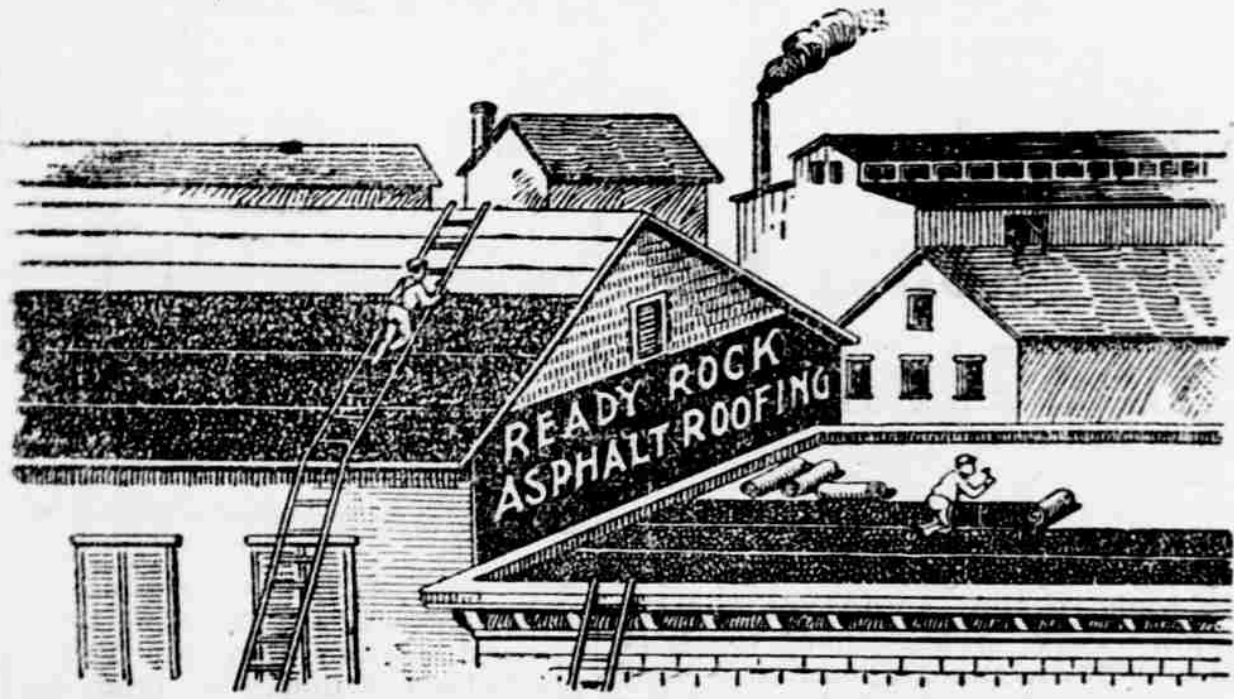

## CLEMENT SEASON

Brilliant Opening at Opera  
House Last Night.

Those Present Much Pleased With  
"The New Dominion"—Strong  
Bill for Saturday

What will prove beyond a doubt to be a great dramatic treat to theatergoers was inaugurated last night, when Mr. Clay Clement and his company began their engagement of three weeks at the Opera House. Mr. Clement comes fresh from a series of artistic successes in the States and certainly those who filled the theater last night can give full evidence that everything said in praise was fully deserved.
