played a consulting expert to examine and report upon their property. He gave an elaborate description of the geology of the country surrounding the mine and of the rock in which it was found, to which no exception could be taken; but when he came to discuss the origin of the pay ore he remarked that some mineral veins were charged by sublimation and some by precipitation, but that the ore under discussion was the first which he had ever been called upon to examine that bore unmistakable evidence of having been charged through the agency of a wheelbarrow. It is to be feared that the practice of wheelbarrow "sailing" has before now extracted a great deal of loose cash from investors in England, who are dazzled with accounts of Comstock bonanzas and the fabulous windings of Mackay and other adventurers.

What a Newspaper Should Be.

THE JOURNAL OF THE FUTURE.

The Philadelphia Price List of a recent date has sketched what a newspaper should be, and truly pictures here the features of what it will be: "We shall not have more news. The world is ransacked for it now. Earth, sea and air bring it to us from every continent and from every island. We shall not have bigger newspapers; they are bigger now than busy people can read. We shall have better newspapers; the stories better told; better brains employed in telling; briefer papers; papers dealing with the more important of current matters in such style and with such fascination that they will command the widest interest. There will be more care and ability in selecting, out of the myriad of things you might tell; the things the people want to be told or ought to be told. There will be a greater skill in putting these things before them in the most convenient and attractive shape. Judgment in selecting the news, genius in telling it—that is the goal for the highest journalistic effort of the future. In making a newspaper the heaviest item of expense used to be the white paper. Now it is the news. By and by, let us hope it will be the brains."

Small-Pox Remedy.

A correspondent writes as follows: I herewith append a recipe which has been used, to my knowledge, in a hundred cases. It will prevent or cure the small-pox, though the pittings are filling. When Jenner discovered cow-pox in England, the world of science hurled an avalanche upon his head, but when the most scientific school of medicine in the world—that of Paris—published this recipe as a panacea for small-pox, it passed unheeded. It is as fulfilling as fate and conquers in every instance. It is harmless when taken by a healthy person. It will also cure the scarlet fever. Here is the recipe as I have used it, and it cured my children of scarlet fever, and will cure small-pox. When learned physicians said the patient must die, it cured:

Salphate of zinc, one grain, foxglove, (digitalis), one grain; one half-teaspoonful of sugar. Mix with two tablespoonfuls of water thoroughly, then add four ounces of water. Take a tablespoonful every hour.

At a recent dinner of the New York Press Club the toast, "The Republic's honored ex-President," was responded to by General Grant, as follows: "Mr. President and Gentlemen of the New York Press Club: I confess to a little embarrassment this evening in being called upon unexpectedly to say a word before a set of such different men as compose, not only the Press Club, but those associated with the Press of the country. I thought this was an evening that I was going to spend where all would be quiet, and good order [laughter]; where nobody would have anything to say. We all know the characteristic modesty of people associated with the Press. [Laughter.] Never want to inquire into anybody's affairs [laughter], what they are going to do [laughter], what they are going to say when they get there. I really thought that you would excuse me this evening, but I suppose you will expect me to say something about the Press, the Press of New York, the Press of the United States, and the Press of the world. It would take a good deal of time to tell what it is possible for the Press to do. I confess at some period of my life when I have read what you had to say about me, that I have lost all faith and all hope [laughter and applause]; but since a young editor (Mr. Ford) has spoken for the Press, and has fixed the life time of a generation of the newspaper men at about twelve years [laughter and applause], I have a growing hope within me that in the future the Press may be able to do some of the great good which we all admit it is possible for it to do. [Applause and laughter.] I have been somewhat of a reader of newspapers for forty years. I could read very well when I was eight years of age, and it has given me forty years of observation of the Press, and there is one peculiarity I have observed, and that is, in all of the walks of life outside of the Press, people have entirely mistaken their profession, their occupation. [Laughter.] I never knew a Mayor of a city, or even a Councilman of any city, any public officer, any Government official, I never knew a member of Congress, Senator or President of the United States, who could not be enlightened in his duties by the youngest member of the Press. [Laughter.] I never knew a General to command a brigade, a division, a corps, an army, who could begin to do it as well as men far away in their sanctuaries, and I often wondered. I was very glad to hear that the newspaper fraternity were ready to take with perfect confidence any office that might be tendered to them, from President to Mayor, and I have often been astonished that citizens have not done so, because they know all these offices would have been well and properly filled. [Laughter.] Well, gentlemen, I am very happy to have been here with you, and I hope when the new generation, about twelve years hence, comes up, that I will again dine with the Press Club of New York, and
