## THE POLICE COURT.

Thirty-three Cases Disposed Of  
this Morning.

Judge Perry made short work of a calendar which presented an imposing array of cases this morning. There were no less than thirty-three of them, ranging from a common, ordinary, every-Saturday-and-Sunday drunk to bribing an officer and having opium in possession.

Ah Sam and Lee Sun, who pleaded not guilty on Thursday last to a charge of being vagabonds, evidently pondered over the matter during the Sabbath and came to the conclusion that they were vagabonds. They pleaded guilty this morning but sentence was suspended until moved on by the prosecution.

A procession of fifteen drunks next appeared in rapid succession. The first one was not present in the flesh nor in the spirit but he was represented by six Kalakaua dollars which His Honor promptly swept into the Court coffers. Of the others, eight pleaded guilty and got the usual fine of \$2 and \$1 costs, except T. Macpherson who was charged \$1 extra for getting drunk on Sunday. The rest were remanded until June 12th.

Ah Kong, Tung Kong and Lum Wing were charged with having opium in possession. The two former laughed to scorn the insinuations of the prosecution that they could be guilty of anything of the kind and the prosecution promptly entered a nolle pro. In their favor. On the other hand Lum Wing acknowledged his guilt and got fined \$50 and costs so quick that it made his head swim.

Six Celestials were next up for gambling, four of whom positively denied any knowledge of any game played for money and were let off by the prosecution. Two of them admitted doing a little gambling yesterday and the admission cost them \$10 each and costs.

Another batch of four Celestials next made their appearance charged with the same offense. This was a case of half and half. Half of them pleaded guilty and got the same fine as above while the others went free.

Ah Kong had as much luck as the Unknowns did in the third innings last Saturday. He was up for bribing a police officer, but the astute acting prosecuting attorney concluded he could not make out a case and let him go free.

M. Cassissa insisted that he was not drunk on Saturday, but the Court thought otherwise. Three dollars fine and \$1.20 costs.

In the perjury case of W. Fernandez, the Court granted, against the objection of defendant's counsel, the motion made by the prosecution that the case be reopened and that the prosecution be allowed to introduce further evidence in chief. The case was then remanded, as were all the others, until June 13th.

## THE CIRCUIT COURT.

Probate and Other Matters of  
Interest to Litigants.

In the matter of the bankruptcy of Tai Wo Chan, the petition of the assignee for discharge comes up before Judge Whiting on Friday.

The hearing of the petition of the administrator of the estate of C. N. Spencer for the examination of his accounts and final discharge also comes up on Friday.

William R. Castle has filed a petition asking that letters of administration on the estate of Henry N. Castle, who died at sea, be issued to James B. Castle. Judge Whiting has set Friday, July 5th, as the time for hearing the petition. The estate is valued at \$28,000 and consists of 90 shares in the Hawaiian Gazette Company, 100 shares Ewa plantation, 50 shares Kahuku plantation and \$10,000 life insurance. The only heirs are the widow and infant daughter.

A judgment has been filed in the case of Ignacio de Fraga vs. The Portuguese Mutual Benefit Society of Hawaii, for the sum of \$392.50 and \$50.75 costs in favor of the plaintiff.

In the case of James J. Byrne vs. John Martin receiver and A. Feek, garnishee, the defendants by F. M. Hatch their attorney have filed an application for a commission to take the testimony of certain witnesses residing at Port Angeles in the State of Washington.

In the admiralty suits arising from the wreck of the Waimanalo, decrees have been entered as follows: In favor of Z. S. Spaulding and against the Sun Insurance Co. of New York for the sum of \$1500 amount of insurance, \$241.10 interest, and costs. In favor of Z. S. Spaulding and against Alliance Marine and General Insurance Co. for \$1500 insurance, \$241.10 interest, and costs. In the matter of the libel against the steamer Waimanalo it is ordered that the same be dismissed with costs.

In the appeal case of Joseph Tinker vs. Wm. Maxwell, J. F. Scott, of the Board of Education garnishee, the plaintiff recovered judgment this morning, for the full amount claimed.

In the equity case of Elizabeth K. Nahaolelua vs. Kaaahu (w.) et al., Henry Smith, commissioner, reports that he has visited the land in question and that it would be impracticable to divide the same. That in his opinion it would be more feasible and practicable to sell the same as a whole at public auction and that he is informed of several persons who would be glad to bid on the same as a whole.

## Admitted to the Bar.

George Anthony Davis, a native of Nova Scotia, was admitted to the bar this morning by the Supreme Court on production of the necessary certificates. Mr. Davis was educated in the public schools of St. John's, New Brunswick, and at the Horton Academy in Nova Scotia. After passing the examination required by the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick he entered the law office of Hon. W. Pugsley, Q. C. He afterwards went to the Harvard Law School where he spent one year. He completed his law studies at the Boston Law School where he obtained the degree of Bachelor of Laws. On his return to St. John's he was admitted to the Supreme Court.
