## THE LEGISLATURE.

### MINISTER DAMON INTRODUCES THREE BILLS RELATING TO FINANCE.

The New Land Bill Brought Up in Both Houses—No Further Sessions This Week.

#### THE HOUSE.

The House was called to order promptly at 3:30 yesterday by Chairman Richards.

The Committee on Credentials reported as follows:

TO THE HON. E. E. RICHARDS, Temporary Chairman, House of Representatives.

Your Committee on Credentials beg leave to report that they have found the duly elected members of this House to be as follows:

1st District—E. E. Richards, R. Rycroft.

2d District—E. C. Bond, G. P. Kamaoaha.

3d District—E. M. Hanuna, A. Pali, W. P. Haia.

4th District—D. L. Naone, E. C. Winston, A. G. M. Robertson.

5th District—J. C. Cluney, James Davis, S. K. Halualani.

6th District—Walter McBryde, S. K. Kao.

Honolulu, June 12, 1895.

Report was accepted and placed on file.

Roll call showed all members present except E. C. Winston.

Justice Frear administered the oath to the body.

Attorney-General Smith stated in reply to a question regarding rules that copies had been prepared for both houses in English and Hawaiian, but had been mislaid. New ones had been arranged and were now being printed. They would be ready by Friday at latest.

The draft would assist the houses in preparing suitable rules for guidance. He suggested that the House proceed to organize under usual parliamentary procedure; that permanent officers be elected in the meantime. Afterward the House could inform the Senate that a committee was ready to form joint rules. Both houses would be conducted under joint rules.

Rep. Naone thought the suggestion a good one, and was in favor of going ahead.

Rep. Robertson moved that the House take a recess for half an hour and go into caucus for the purpose of deciding on the permanent officers other than the speaker, that official having been determined on at the caucus held in the morning. After half an hour's desultory discussion the motion finally prevailed and at 4:30 the House took a recess.

At 5:45 the House resumed its sitting.

Rep. Kamaoaha moved that the rules be suspended and permanent officers elected. Carried.

Rep. Hanuna nominated D. L. Naone as Speaker, who was declared unanimously elected. The new presiding officer addressed the body, thanking them for the honor conferred upon him. He had had but little experience, and would ask the assistance and forbearance of the members in carrying on the business of the House.

W. L. Wilcox was unanimously elected interpreter, being placed in nomination by Rep. Kamaoaha.

James N. K. Keola was nominated for Secretary by Rep. Hanuna and unanimously elected, as was P. Bruce as Sergeant-at-Arms and Messenger.

Rev. J. Waiamau was elected Chaplain.

Reps. Robertson, Bond and Richards were appointed Committee on Rules.

Secretary Keola was instructed to inform the Senate that the House had perfected its organization.

A communication was read from Secretary Clay giving the list of officers of the Senate. Accepted and placed on file.

The Secretary was instructed to inform Rev. J. Waiamau of his election as chaplain.

At 6 p. m. the House adjourned till 10 a. m. this morning.

#### THE SENATE.

President Wilder called the Senate to order promptly at 10 o'clock this morning.

Chaplain Peck offered a prayer. Roll called, all present.

Communication from the House of Representatives read, announcing that the House was organized and ready for business.

Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

Representative Richards as a committee of one from the House, reported Concurrent Resolution No. 1 to the effect that a joint committee of one from each House be appointed to notify the President that the Legislature is organized and ready to receive any communication from him.

Senator Brown moved that the Senate concur in said resolution. Carried. President Wilder appointed Senator Kamaoaha as the Senate Committee.

The President reported that he had received copies of the annual reports of the Labor Commission, Attorney-General, Minister of Finance, and Board of Health.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to have such blanks printed as were necessary until the Committee on Printing was appointed.

Owing to the indisposition of the Minister of the Interior the Attorney-General introduced "An Act relating to Public Lands." Read by title for the first time. Each member received a copy in English and will be furnished one in Hawaiian to-morrow.

Senator Kamaoaha reported that in conjunction with Representative Richards, the President had been duly notified that the Legislature was in session.

Adjourned till 10 a. m. on Monday.

#### THE HOUSE.

Promptly at 10 o'clock Speaker Naone called the House to order.

Chaplain Waiamau offered up a short prayer in native.

The minutes were then read, and after being interpreted, were approved.

Min. Smith moved a concurrent resolution that a committee of one be appointed, to act in conjunction with a similar committee from the Senate, to inform the President that both branches of the Legislature were organized. Carried.

The Speaker appointed Rep. Richards as such committee and to present the resolution to the Senate.

At 10:40 a message was received from the Senate stating that it concurred in the resolution and had appointed Senator Kamaoaha as a committee to act with Rep. Richards.

The Attorney-General asked leave in the absence of Minister King through illness to introduce a bill relating to Public Lands, and moved that it be read the first time by title.

Rep. Robertson asked if the bill had been introduced in the Senate and was informed that it had.

Rep. Kamaoaha inquired if it was intended for the House to take up the bill first, to which the Attorney-General replied that the bill was presented to both Houses to act on at their convenience.

The motion for the first reading then passed.

Rep. Richards reported that the joint committee had notified the President that the Legislature was ready to receive any message from him, and that he desired a list of officers and members of the House.

The clerk reported having already furnished the same.

Rep. Kamaoaha introduced a resolution that the House proceed to elect the five members of the Council of State, there being no other business pending.

Rep. Robertson moved to adjourn till 10 a. m. to-morrow, but withdrew his motion at the request of the Attorney-General.

Minister Damon moved as an amendment to the resolution that a committee of three be appointed to select the names of a number of persons suitable for the office, and that such selections shall not bar the House from offering others when the matter comes up. The amendment was carried.

Minister Damon then suggested that the committee should be selected entirely from members of the House.

Speaker Naone appointed Reps. Robertson, Kamaoaha and Richards as the Committee.

Minister Damon presented a supplementary appropriation bill, and moved that it be read the first time, translated and printed. Carried. The bill appropriates \$156,250.

Minister Damon then introduced a supplementary appropriation bill under the Loan Act. The bill appropriates \$32,300. Ordered translated and printed in both languages.

Minister Damon then introduced an Act to regulate the Currency Act. The bill is designed to withdraw the present issue of silver certificates see and if they correspond with the amount of silver on deposit in the treasury. The bill also provides for the issue of gold certificates. Read the first time, ordered translated and printed.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to provide the necessary blanks and stationery for the use of the House.

The report of the Committee to wait on the President was accepted and the Committee discharged.

Major Potter was introduced and presented the message of the President which was received and partly read.

Rep. Hanuna moved that the further reading be dispensed with and that it be translated into Hawaiian and printed.

The House then adjourned till 10 a. m. Monday.
